Expressing Our Faith

Dear St. Barnabas',

One of the more popular songs among my friends in the early aughts was "Seasons of Love" from the musical *Rent*. Perhaps it particularly resonated with our sense of the incredible preciousness of life as we sought to find our sense of place and purpose. Perhaps we found the song during a time when even the most tenuous of relationships seemed to take on a heightened significance as we moved into adulthood. As a young adult, each and every year seemed to bring dramatic changes and new revelations. Looking back, I wonder, if the lyrics to "Seasons of Love" had been written in ancient Greek, would the love described have been an *Agape*, *Eros*, *Ludus*, *Philia*, or *Pragma* kind of love? What exactly was the nature of the "seasons of love" expressed in that song? And what exactly are we being invited to learn about the nature of God's love for each of us as we move through the seasons of our lives?

This November, we are faced with a national election and we are also entering into the unofficial beginning of the holiday season. In addition, we are approaching the conclusion of our liturgical year on Christ the King Sunday at the end of the month. This is all happening at an entirely unprecedented time in our world today. Uncertainty abounds in economic, cultural, political, medical, and social spheres. We don't know what the future might hold. But we can take heart from the reliability of our faith. Our Creator gives us the wisdom to respond to a variety of different circumstances. The grace and peace of Christ empowers us to assemble and then put into practice our own set of spiritual tools. This "spiritual toolbox" is both versatile and powerful, and includes our very own Book of Common Prayer. We have so many spiritual exemplars in our faith, from people we've known personally to people whose words, life, faith, or legacy has influenced our own faith in a more indirect way.

This November, I hope and pray that you will take time to give thanks for those who have had a positive influence on your life. I hope and pray that you will take good care with your friends, family, and others with whom you have a substantial relationship, even and especially if you can't visit them in the usual way. And I do hope and pray that you will continue to take action for a better world, even in the midst of the difficulties we are all facing. That includes taking the time to vote. Vote as your conscience leads you. Vote as your faith

Vestry Highlights—October 2020

Support for the Hypothermia Shelter program was approved. This year we commit to providing dinner meals for one week in February for 50-55 people. The Vestry approved \$1,000 to be transferred to the Rector's Discretionary Fund to be used for expenses that might be incurred for food, etc.

The Vestry approved \$45,000 for our 2021 Diocesan pledge.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on November 22 via ZOOM from 11:15 a.m.-12 noon. The nominating committee will present a slate for election to the Vestry at the Annual Meeting. The Annual Report will be emailed on Thursday, November 19; paper copies can be requested, as well.

John Westerlund submitted the following motions from the Finance Committee:

- Salary increases for the full and part-time staff
- Short Term Disability and Long Term Disability coverages for the Rector and Parish Administrator
- Continuance of all loose plate offerings going to the Rector's Discretionary Fund

A draft 2021 budget was submitted and will be voted on at the November meeting.

Our next Work Day is scheduled for November 21 from 9:30 am-12 noon; rain date is November 28.

In-person outdoor services are scheduled at 10:15 am (only) on November 1 and December 6, weather permitting. These services will be livestreamed.

An in-person Christmas Eve outdoor service is scheduled at 3:30 pm, weather permitting; this service will not be livestreamed. We plan online worship later on Christmas Eve and on Christmas morning.

It is likely that there will be no in-person outdoor services from Christmas to Palm Sunday because of winter weather.



ACCA News - Annandale Christian Community for Action

Family Emergency Assistance and Food Pantry. The economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic have greatly increased requests to ACCA for emergency assistance. A CARES Act grant Annandale Christian Community for Action from Fairfax County has helped ACCA respond to this need. In September, ACCA provided families in the Annandale and Bailey's A coalition of churches serving those in need



Crossroads area with a total of \$564,000 in emergency assistance. This was mostly for rent and some utility payments, and mostly people eligible for CARES Act assistance. ACCA expects the CARES Act grant to be exhausted by November. As an example of help, ACCA paid back rent for a senior couple and their daughter. The father was not able to work due to COVID and surgeries. The family 's income was not enough to pay rent and the father had exhausted unemployment benefits. ACCA also paid back rent for a single parent family with three children under the age of six. The mother lost her full-time job due to COVID.

The Food Pantry delivered a week's groceries to 124 households and gave gift cards to 23 other families in September. County food drives and church and individual food donations brought in over 15,000 pounds of food in September. Donations of nonperishable food and hygiene supplies continue to be needed. Donations can be brought to the pantry at 7200 Columbia Pike (weekdays 1-5 p.m. and November 7, 9-11:30 a.m.), or they can be brought to St. Barnabas.

Fund Raising Campaign - ACCA's major fund-raising project has been re-named the "COVID Challenge Campaign" to recognize the challenge of economic impacts of the pandemic and the resulting increase in assistance requests to ACCA. Donations support emergency assistance to those in need and childcare. The campaign runs November 1 through January 31, 2021. To donate, please make your check payable to ACCA (please note Challenge Campaign in the memo line) and mail it to 7200 Columbia Pike, Annandale VA 22003. You can also designate ACCA in a check payable to St. Barnabas' or gift through Realm.

Thanks to everyone who donated. The Annandale CROP Hunger Walk raises funds for Church World Service and ACCA to fight poverty, hunger and disaster around the world and in our community. Child Development Center – The Center is providing care to over 200 infants and preschool and school-aged children of low-income families and families of essential workers.

Furniture Ministry – The furniture program developed health protocols and resumed in September. Thanks to Jim Aiken and the Mittelholtz' for volunteering at the furniture warehouse on October 10. Furniture volunteers deliver furniture to households in need and pick up donations. Gently used mattresses, tables and chairs, sofas, dressers, lamps and bedding are needed. 

Episcopal Church Women 130th Fall Meeting

On October 15th, 2020, the ECW of the Diocese of Virginia held its 130th Fall Meeting, its 131st UTO Ingathering, and its 1st virtual Webinar on the Feast Day of St. Teresa of Avila. The meeting was led by President Cindy Helton and officiated by the Rt. Rev. Susan E. Goff, Bishop Suffragan and the Very Rev. Kim Coleman, ECW chaplain.

Presenters were as follows:

Captain Harry R. Salinas, Fairfax County Government Commissioner, spoke about the Office of Human Rights & Equity Programs. This office provides education and enforces the Human Rights Ordinance of 1974: respecting the dignity of every person and preventing discrimination.

The Rev. J. Randy Myers, President of GraceInside, shared stories of the origin of this prison ministry and of his personal involvement. GraceInside's chaplains instill hope, values, and spiritual healing to the nearly 30,000 men and women in Virginia state prisons. This ministry is strongly supported by the ECW of the Diocese of Virginia, as well as by our own Women of St. Barnabas (WOSB).

Victoria Fong, administrator at Jackson-Feild homes, presented success stories of "graduates" from the Behavioral Health Services residential facility. Working with children and their families, the program aids in healing the effects of mental health and substance abuse. The WOSB have and continue to support this ministry.

Bishop Goff's sermon focused on the amazing life of St. Teresa of Avila. A woman who stood on her own two feet, even in the man's world of her time, Teresa left her mark on the Roman Catholic Church. While she was a woman "for God", she was also a woman for others...a woman who inspired and gave life.

Cantor Joy Warburton and guitarist Julio Cuellar provided music for our hearts and souls.

New officers were elected and sworn in by Bishop Goff, with Cindy Helton graciously extending her term by 1 year, while the search continues for an eligible and willing candidate for that position.

Annandale United Methodist Church (AUMC) Heritage Food Site

The WOSB have long supported the Heritage Food Site, and before the pandemic there was a basket in the narthex for donations of food which our members took to the site. Now of course that is not possible. Before COVID the Food Site had been serving 60-70 families each week on Thursdays. That number has increased to 220 bags for Thursday families. The World Central Kitchen chef, José Andrés, donated 500 meals on each Monday and Friday from April 1 to July 30. A local charity with a food truck is now providing 300 burritos on Monday and Friday. Annandale United Methodist Church (AUMC) supplements the meals with produce, bread, and pastry products it purchases or that have been donated.



A Note About ASYP (the Annandale Safe Youth Project)

The Annandale Safe Youth Project could not operate the program in person since March 2020 due to COVID-19. Since then, the staff continued to do individual wellness checks and organized virtual meetings and activities. At this time, the children continue to receive virtual tutoring and mentoring. Each Wednesday staff deliver groceries to the homes of the participants and make sure to connect their families with any resources they need. The children are eager to come back to St. Barnabas', which is their second home.

Currently, we are open for in-person services by appointment at our Family Resource Centers in Culmore and Springfield. Parents can make an appointment to come to the centers to receive assistance filling out forms and applying for benefits, filing for unemployment, and getting support with homework. At these two centers we operate food


