The Episcopal catechism answers the question of why we remember the dead in prayer: page 862 of the Book of Common Prayer affirms that "We pray for them, because we still hold them in our love, and because we trust that in God's presence those who have chosen to serve him will grow in his love, until they see him as he is."

Those who I love but see no longer are also a part of why stewardship of the church is so important to me. In my own life prior to St. Barnabas', I'm

aware of many wise individuals who have been a strong inspiration to me in my life and ministry—not only from my congregation during college, but also from other churches of which I've been a part, both before and after that time. Judith and Allison are coming to mind for me, as well as many family members who have gone on to the greater Glory. Perhaps you have individuals who have influenced your approach to service and who have been a significant part of your story. For me, it is helpful to consider that the best of their example and their values are still with us.

When I was growing up, my parents didn't talk in detail with me and my brother about all of the expenditures in the family budget. I wonder if their choice to share that information gradually, on a more "need to know" basis, was partly born of a desire to protect us from becoming consumed by the topic. Perhaps it was also partly done to protect me and my brother from making unhelpful comparisons in our more informal conversations with classmates. I remember my father repeating the aphorism over and over, that comparisons just make one vain or bitter. So, while I was aware that different families approached their relationships with money in different ways, and I was aware of the church's efforts to make service trips and other church events accessible to all, regardless of finances, I admit that stewardship wasn't something that we talked about a lot. In adulthood, however, ministry and life has helped me recognize that there are many different ways that we can think about caring for our resources in order to share them effectively, whether they are resources of talent, time, or treasure. I wonder if our stewardship conversations can be like our Celebrations of Life, in a way-an opportunity for us to recognize and share our most important family values and the gifts that we have received from those who have helped prepare the Way for us, by God's grace. Our most significant conversations can help us to clarify where we are now and where we would like to be in the future, with God's help. And our 60th Anniversary Celebration was just one such space for those kinds of conversations: to learn about the service and ministries that St. Barnabas' has been able to undertake in the past, through the love of Jesus Christ and to dream together, with God and with one another, about the many good things still to do in the future! And for that, I am deeply thankful.

A "Note" from David Palmer These Are the Times That Try [People's] Souls

What does the word "soul" mean to you? It gets used in a lot of ways. In 1968, my music-loving big brothers were talking about an increasingly popular type of rhythm and blues that came to be called Soul, a term that seemed to be codified when Time magazine came out with a cover story on soul that featured Aretha Franklin. "Soul" had been used for the sound of many earlier artists, from Ray Charles to Etta James to Sam Cooke, all of whom brought certain elements of gospel style into the secular world.

Outside the world of music, I think most of us use "soul" to refer to the deeper part of a person, the part that transcends one's body. It comes up in the Catholic and Episcopal church when we pray for the souls of the departed to rest in peace. Regardless of whether one's prayers can affect one who has passed to eternity, we are acknowledging that, though one's body be dead, something immortal persists.

In this life, we experience soul as the deepest part of ourselves that underlies ego and persona, that reminds us of who we truly are, and that responds to transcendent qualities of love and beauty. Thomas Moore, who has written such books as Care of the Soul and Soul Therapy, defines soul as "not a thing but a quality or dimension of experiencing life and ourselves. It has to do with depth, value, relatedness, heart and personal substance." Moore has also written about the dark night of the soul, an expression that goes back to St. John of the Cross of the 16th century. To my way of thinking, it was as if St. John gave a name for an experience not uncommon to humanity; I would describe it as a difficult experience that cuts one to the core, to the soul.

The turbulent experience of the soul was described 2500 years before John in many verses of the psalms, mostly in ones attributed to King David, who had his share of difficulties. Psalm 6:3: "My soul is greatly dismayed." Psalm 42:5: "Why are you cast down, O my soul? And why are you disquieted in me? Hope in God." Psalm 69:1: "Save me, O God; for the waters are come in unto my soul." (A modern translation says, "God, God, save me! I'm in over my head." Whatever the correct translation, the psalmist was overwhelmed!) Many verses in Psalm 119: "My soul breaketh... My soul cleaveth unto the dust... My soul melteth for heaviness... My soul fainteth for thy salvation... Quicken me, O Lord, for thy name's sake: for thy righteousness' sake bring my soul out of trouble."

While listening to speakers at an online conference about a year ago, I was captivated by the idea of "world soul." The speakers used the expression in a mostly poetic fashion, that is, if the whole world had a soul, some aspect of being/thinking/feeling that unites the human family, what would it be like? What would it be experiencing now? At some point, I decided that this would be the title of my next album, and, for the months that followed,


I considered ideas for songs in the light of world soul. While my conscious mind is always part of my creative process, the idea of apocalypse seemed to emerge naturally in a few songs, but not always in its dreadful sense. The most serious statement of apocalypse comes from the *music* (the lyrics aren't entirely serious) of a piece called Apocalypse in 9/8, a 1973 composition by the rock group Genesis. (Here is a live version, with a sound clip added later to the beginning, of David and his band performing this in the 90s: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=635HFGjAyfc) Throughout this year of preparation/composition, I have thought that much of the human race has been feeling overwhelming fears that could reasonably be called apocalyptic, but, ultimately, I became less drawn to world soul than to "Whirled Soul" (see those Bible verses), and that's the name of the album that has just been released. It makes no dire pronouncements on the future of humanity; most of its songs are instrumentals and probably sound upbeat. At least one song gently but transparently expresses hope. I do feel that our collective soul is being whirled right now, so I offer a gentle piece at the end that I hope is good for going to sleep to. I invite you to listen to another of its tracks, Adaptation, here https:// youtu.be/svBpk0DylCg:

What about you? If the whole world shared a soul (kind of like Jung's collective unconscious), how do you think it would be feeling right now? Feeling cast down? Feeling disquieted? Having trouble adapting to the demands of our times? Hoping in God? Maybe St. Barnabasians would be interested to hear your thoughts. I know I would be.




A Hearty Thank-you!

September 21, 2022

• The Vestry approved a pledge of \$30,092 to the Diocese of Virginia for 2023, in preparation for the Diocesan Annual Convention this November. The figure is in accordance with the Virginia Plan for Covenantal Giving, which requests that each parish pledge 8% of their average income, calculated from the Parochial Reports from the past three years, or apply for an exception.

- The Finance Committee will begin work on the 2023 budget in October/November. The Treasurer also mentioned
 that the parish's insurance policy could potentially be reviewed for updates, as the contract was originally signed
 over ten years ago.
- Planning is underway to potentially partner with a hospice organization in order to offer a six-month Grief Support Circle program, from November 2022-April 2023; meetings will be held via Zoom.
- With Pride Month complete, our Pride flags have been moved to the Lyles Room and Rite 13 classroom, where they can continue to be appreciated. The new banners out front will help to spread the word about our Services, our Christian Formation hour, as well as our Youth Choir and Cherub Choir.

- The Vestry agreed that St. Barnabas will participate in the 2023 Hypothermia Shelter program. We will provide and serve meals for the week of Feb. 26-Mar. 4. Specific locations are being finalized, but the locations are likely to be in or around Annandale. Cindy McLaughlin has agreed to be the Coordinator.

- Our congregational celebration of Christmas Eve is intended to begin at 4:30 PM with a prelude prior to our 5 PM Eucharist on Saturday, December 24th. The plan for Christmas Day is to have one service of Holy Eucharist that Sunday, December 25th, at 10:15 AM.
