Noticing and Welcoming the Spirit

Dear Friends,

Pentecost isn't just an opportunity to wear one's most audacious color – to weigh in on an ongoing debate about whether coral, garnet, vermilion, or another hue is the best expression of those lowest wavelengths on the visible electromagnetic spectrum. Pentecost is a birthday party for the church, one of the three principal feasts of the liturgical year. (There was a long stretch of time in England when Whitsunday was a bigger deal than Christmas!) This is our opportunity to celebrate the gift of the Spirit, the Power from on high that showed up the midst of the disciples after the incarnate Word had Risen from death. The promise is that we have been gifted with the same Spirit that animated our Savior. The church is still inspired by the Spirit that is working in surprising and transformational ways. And we are still living into the fulfillment of the word from God that was promised in the second chapter of the book of Joel: "I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your children shall prophesy, and your youths shall see visions, and your elders shall dream dreams."

The metaphor of fire for the Holy Spirit reminds us that the power of compassion is still expressing itself through cultures and languages that are continually changing, as our circumstances and opportunities also continue to change. The Spirit works in surprising and transformational ways that are simultaneously consistent, and also, ever new.

So, are you ready for God to do something new in your life? Is the Spirit inviting you into a new rhythm of life, a new way to practice and embody your faith and humanity? No one else can live your life for you. God is waiting for you to notice the miraculous in the midst of all the mundane. God is asking if you are ready to fully rely on God for your life, for your well-being, and for your meaningful service in this world. It is a daunting consideration, but it can also be an inspiring one: that in the midst of whatever stress or pain or uncertainty we may be feeling, God is right here with us, as close as our every breath, seeking to bring forth good.

One of the concluding prayers for Rite II Evening Prayer draws on the concluding words of the letter to the Ephesians: "Glory to God whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine." (BCP p. 126) The Spirit is more creative and wise than we can possibly comprehend.

A Note from David Palmer

At the time I'm writing this, we are in the final weeks of Lent, and the Adult, Youth, and Cherub choirs are all preparing anthems for Easter that talk about Christ rising again. There is no resurrection without a death, and even the little ones are singing, "On the cross, he died for me." If I had worried about teaching the children a song about dying, I should have remembered that, every Sunday, our communion service is a vivid reminder of the sacrificial death of the Lamb, Jesus.

As a society, a church family, and individuals, we have had our share of death recently. Our nation has just had another school shooting. St. Barnabas' has had to say goodbye to Carolyn Lilienthal. One of my best friends recently called to say that she expects to die in the next 1 to 3 months. There's never a perfect way to process our grief at these times, but musicians have certainly tried to find ways.

In past ages, composers might write a requiem – a mass for the dead – either on commission or to express their own grief. Mozart was writing his celebrated requiem at the time of his death; his widow suggested that Mozart came to believe that he was writing the requiem for his own funeral. Johannes Brahms composed his *Requiem* between 1865, the year of his mother's death, and 1868. Unlike the many Latin requiems composed before it, Brahms wrote his in German. Gabriel Fauré declared that his *Requiem* "wasn't written for anything – for pleasure, if I may call it that!" He also wrote that the work is dominated "by a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest." Maurice Duruflé began writing his *Latin Requiem* during the German occupation of France.

Some requiems have been written more recently. John Rutter's *Requiem* was first performed in 1985. Andrew Lloyd Webber's *Requiem* was first performed several months before in 1985. Both were written in memory of the composers' fathers. Andy and Jessica Riddle sang the *Pie Jesu* from Lloyd Webber's *Requiem* at Carolyn Lilienthal's funeral. Igor Stravinsky wrote his *Requiem Canticles* in 1966, and the work was performed five years later at the composer's funeral.

The requiem that has made the biggest impact on me is Benjamin Britten's War Requiem. Commissioned for the consecration of a new Cathedral in Coventry, England, the old one having been bombed during World War II, the War Requiem was premiered in 1962. Britten was a gifted composer, in my opinion; you might enjoy hearing his Ceremony of Carols at Christmastime, if you haven't heard it already. The War Requiem is dark and powerful, weaving poems by Wilfred Owen into the traditional Latin text. Owen wrote nearly all of his poems between 1917 and 1918; he was killed in World War I, in November of 1918. Britten selected poems that are full of references to scripture, including the story of Abraham and Isaac. By placing these poems in the portions of the Mass, Britten

ACCA News -Annandale Christian Community for Action

Rebuilding Together – Thanks to volunteers who – by the time you read this article – will have helped at the Rebuilding Together National Rebuilding Day on April 29th. The project is one of two sponsored by ACCA this year. The team includes volunteers from St. Barnabas', Annandale United Methodist Church, and other ACCA churches. As of mid-April, expected St. Barnabas' volunteers include the Rev. John Bolin Shellito, Scott Cannon, Dave Wright, Behn Ayala, and Camille Mittelholtz, as well as our project leader, Ken Mittelholtz. We will be working on a group home owned and operated by Hartwood Foundation, which develops and operates residential service programs for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Our work will be outside and includes installing pavers, repairing a pergola, rebuilding wood planter boxes, fence repair, and exterior painting.

ACCA has sponsored Rebuilding Together (formerly Christmas in April) home repair projects since 1990, and St. Barnabas' has co-sponsored projects since 1994. Patti Klein, the Executive Director of Rebuilding Together-Arlington-Fairfax-Falls Church, recently joined the ACCA monthly Board of Directors meeting, thanking ACCA and participating churches for our support and updating Board members on the program. About 75 percent of Rebuilding Together-AFF's work is done through its Rebuilding Together Express program, which completes safety repairs. If you know of a homeowner of limited means who needs help with home repairs and safety and energy improvements, contact Ken or Camille for details on how the homeowner can apply for help.

Furniture Ministry – Thanks to our St. Barnabas' volunteers who delivered furniture to needy households and picked up donated furniture. Team members included the Rev. John Bolin Shellito, Scott Cannon, and Camille & Ken Mittelholtz. In March, the Furniture Ministry program gave furniture to nine households (29 people). Our next day to volunteer is Saturday, July 8th.

Child Development Center – The ACCA CDC provides quality early education and childcare to 200 infants, toddlers, and preschool children. About 60 of the children have special needs. In April, the ACCA Board elected two individuals to the CDC Board of Directors.

Family Emergency Assistance and Food Pantry – ACCA helped 28 households in March with urgently needed assistance in paying rent or utilities. This number is somewhat fewer than the number of families in late 2022 and early 2023, when needs were extremely high. The ACCA Food Pantry continues to have high demand for urgent help with groceries and hygiene products. In March, volunteers delivered food to 139 households. Volunteer drivers are needed to deliver food.

30 Hour Famine

From Friday, March 24th through Saturday, March 25th, the Youth Group participated in the 30 Hour Famine at St. Barnabas'. For those who may not be familiar with it, the 30 Hour Famine is a program created by World Vision which helps youth experience a day and a half of going without food to raise funds for the hungry, as well as to raise awareness of hunger worldwide and in our own communities. St. Barnabas' youth fasted for 30 hours, from 12 p.m. Friday to 6 p.m. Saturday, consuming only juice and water. During our fast, we participated in activities and games based on world hunger. One game that was a big hit was a game we played Friday night called "Deadliest Predator." The game is like "tag" in the dark, but to win you have to collect three survival items that were hidden around the Richardson Room and in the hallway. The teams loved it!

The next morning, we discussed hunger in Fairfax County, then split into teams for a grocery shopping activity. Each team had \$20 to feed a family of four for a day, including breakfast, lunch, and dinner, taking nutrition, portion size, and price all into account. We found that teams often left healthier items behind, opting for cheaper, less nutritious items, and that store brands are just as good as name brands. After the shopping we donated all of what we bought to the ACCA food pantry and stocked the shelves. We donated 154 lbs. of food! Finally, we went disc golfing to push through those final hours of hunger. We finished our famine in the nave in front of the altar with a final reflection, compline, and communion together, and then followed with a meal to break our fast!

Thank you so much to all who helped with the weekend, especially Dawn Schaefer, Mark Patterson, Ellen Riddle, Reverend John, and Jean from ACCA. And THANK YOU to everyone who has submitted their water bottle full of spare change that will be donated to World Vision. We had such a fun time with the youth and thank everyone at St. Barnabas' for your support throughout the weekend!

Why We Go on Mission Trips

At breakfast on Day 6 of my recent mission trip with Friends of the Episcopal Church, a fellow team member who had been working with the pre-school told me that she would like to buy a duffle bag full of school supplies and send it down to Cuba with me on my next trip, which I was already planning.

I was going to Palma Soriano to meet with the priest there to discuss that future trip. My taxi wasn't coming until around 10:00 a.m., so I stopped into the pre-school classroom to talk with the director while the kids were outside. The director, Iliya, knew that I had a cold and she asked me how I was. I told her that I was a bit better and she asked if I would like some tea; I accepted. (When you're helping others, it's important to let them help you. Not to mention, I appreciated the offer!)

Her "tea" was about 6 ounces of boiling water poured over a few mint leaves that she had gathered. She gave me half of her tea. I asked Iliya how she was doing: *Agotada*. Exhausted. Her bicycle brakes had broken that morning on the way to work. I've done a good bit of work on my own bikes over the years, so I asked to look at it. A cable had broken on the rear brake. This cable has a special fitting at the end and one cannot just jury-rig a fix. The part would be difficult to find in Cuba. I looked over the bike and saw that the knobby wheel was worn smooth and the rubber was cracking. It would not last much longer. The bike seat was held together by two bands of duct tape. And it was a child's bike with the seat extended really high. It just wasn't much of a bike.

My team member (the one who had told me that that she wanted to send the duffle bag of supplies on my upcoming trip) was sitting with the kids, and I did not want to disturb her. Instead, I looked for the trip leader and told him about the bike. I also mentioned that I had noticed one in the window of a nearby store for \$280. Shortly after that my taxi arrived and I went off to my meeting.

When I returned from my meeting, there was a brand new bike sitting in the courtyard. The team had taken up a collection, arranged with the rector's wife to convert our U.S. currency into something that would work with the store's restrictions, and bought a bike. Iliya's husband, who is a helper at the church, assembled the bike. I am told that when Iliya saw it, she was overwhelmed and said that she had heart palpitations.

This is why I go on mission trips.

Introduction to Dream-Share Groups this Summer

Are you curious about your dreams? Most people are. In many communities throughout the world, people meet regularly to discuss dreams and their possible meanings. Sometimes these dream groups are one of the activities of a Jung society; sometimes they are offered at a church. They can be a means for understanding oneself and one's relationships but are not intrusive; the limits of each participant's comfort zone are respected. Some find the numinous aspect of dreams to be a grace-filled adjunct to their spiritual journey. The group adheres to the norms of circles of trust as laid out by Parker Palmer, and no participant is required to share a dream. Its approach to dream-sharing involves the listeners imagining the dream as if it were their own; the dreamer listens to these projections for possible insights and is free to reject anything that doesn't click. This is the method encouraged by Montague Ullman, Robert Haden, Jeremy Taylor, and others. While many find these supportive groups to be a means to greater wholeness, they are not an appropriate substitute for the services of a mental health professional.

David Palmer is offering a 10-week introduction to dream groups this summer on Wednesday evenings, 6:30-8:30, in the Rite 13 classroom. Each meeting consists of a check-in, some discussion of readings (Jeremy Taylor's *The Wisdom of Your Dreams*), a moment of centering, and dream sharing and discussion. Attendees of the group needn't be members of St. Barnabas' or any church, but should be 18 or older. If there is sufficient interest (a viable dream group needs at least 4 people) once the introduction is over, a regular, monthly meeting with shared leadership could be held on-line. 
