
Keeping Space for God

Dear St. Barnabas' Family,

I've been thankful to be a part of the Education for Ministry group this fall, where part of the learning has involved listening to Diarmaid MacCulloch's book, Christianity: The First Three Thousand Years. While I was initially frustrated by the author's seemingly somewhat aloof approach to faith-asserting himself as a "friend to Christianity" rather than an active participant in his introduction-I was also entranced by his disciplined approach to his own thinking and emotions regarding the history of Christianity, as well as his formation, having grown up in a parsonage, with a Church of England Priest as one of his parents. My understanding of MacCulloch's faith also shifted when I learned more about his sexuality-I became more impressed by his writing and teaching after I learned that he had experienced resistance from church leadership after initially serving as an openly gay Deacon in the Church of England in the 1980's. Rather than simply writing off the Church and the faith of Jesus in the wake of this painful experience, he was willing to go deeper, researching and sharing his own understanding of the truth of the story. And I wonder if that is a part of our calling, too.

Since Ordination, my experience of life has consisted of a greater and greater awareness of how much life depends radically on God. Even in my youth and young adulthood—even in times when I had a lot of unanswered questions about God's presence and nature—even when I felt uncertain about how exactly it happened that prayer could so radically transform me and how I interacted with the world, when I wondered how exactly prayer works—even in times of uncertainty, pain, and difficulty, when I couldn't always recognize God's involvement in my life, there were still many wise and faithful authority figures who were interested in guiding me and others away from purposelessness and toward participation in God's redemptive goodness.

That is not to say that I didn't make my own mistakes along the way: I do believe it is miraculous that I am still alive today and able to write to you now. However, as my number of years of life has increased, I've gained a deeper appreciation for the wise and faithful authority figures, who (like Bishops) embody the incarnate Redeemer in their actions by caring for those on the edge, by translating ancient truths into our postmodern culture, by creating something

good out of experiences of difficulty and challenge, by healing evil through the underappreciated power of God's compassion, and by keeping space for positive relationships. Far too often, I didn't realize what was going on simply because I was so focused on myself. But others knew what they were doing. To use the language of one of our three mission priority areas here in the Diocese of Virginia, they were *sharing the faith of Jesus*. (For those interested, the other two mission priority areas are *healing across differences* and *honoring and caring for God's creation*).

However we describe it, those individuals who have shared the faith of Jesus with us are also the reason why I'm thankful that <u>Enriching Our Worship</u> describes our service on October 28th as "The Renewal of Ministry with the Welcoming of a New Rector." This title represents a change of emphasis from the earlier <u>Book of Common Prayer</u> Rite, which was more focused on the "Installation" of the one new and highly visible Ordained individual. The more recent <u>Enriching our Worship</u> text emphasizes the renewal of the ministry of all the Baptized with the renewal of our Baptismal vows and the celebration of the many continuing ministries of St. Barnabas'. In my own life, while I'm thankful for the faithful Rectors who were a positive part of my life in years past, I believe my life has been much more powerfully shaped by the actions of those who were not Rectors, and who were sharing the faith of Jesus, in the power of Christ, by keeping space for God in the lives of those around them.

I wonder how much Diarmaid MacCulloch's parents were among those who kept space for God in his life, and how much of MacCulloch's writing will be a worldwide inspiration to the Church in the years ahead. The story of the faith of Jesus is still unfolding, and our ministry together here is a part of that story. The Renewal of Ministry with the Welcoming of a New Rector is about how we are adapting the faithful practices of our forebears, and how we are keeping space for God here in northern Virginia for our own time.

A Note from David Palmer


At the time of writing this article, I recently have had to deal with a broken tooth, a piece of vitreous that has broken off in my eye, and a torn retina. I'm falling apart! Nature tends toward entropy, but the good doctors have respectively repaired my tooth and halted the tear in my retina. So far, I can still drive with my detached vitreous, which appears as a translucent floater. I wouldn't want to enter a competition over who has the worst "war wounds" (kind of a negative competition); rather, these experiences and other aspects of my physical decline prompt me to offer a meditation on the seasons of life, and what it means to be a senior citizen.

Philosophy professor Valerie Tiberius, in an op-ed for the October 3rd edition of *The Washington* Post ("Why you should swap your bucket list for a chuck-it list"), commented on the phenomenon that many experience in their golden years of increasing limitations that frustrate earlier aspirations. Ms. Tiberius' father proposed that, instead of grieving, stressing, or feeling frustrated over not attaining long-held hopes, he begin to "chuck" the items on his bucket list. Some items can be physical like, "Run a marathon? Not with these knees. Chuck it." Or professional, like "Get that position? Publish that book? Make a million bucks? Those ships have sailed. Onto the chuck-it list." Or not. There are many examples of people who attain professional accomplishments in their senior years, musicians among them, but most people eventually retire. Sooner or later, we all retire permanently from this world, so why not reflect on the meaning of our lives and take a thoughtful approach to our remaining years? The act of doing so reminds me of the words we hear on Ash Wednesday, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," or this verse from Psalm 90: "So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom."

In his 2000 book, <u>Still Here</u> (highly recommended if you want to explore these issues), Ram Dass points out that, after a lifetime of keeping busy and productive, one can feel guilty for just being still and that a thoughtful approach to aging "requires a great deal of stillness in order to awaken to the wisdom within us." (p. 100) One of the things that accrues to the elderly is the wisdom of experience. Maybe we can teach someone something...if they'll listen! Ram Dass also sees aging as a time to let go of our ego. The striving to be impressive, successful, or powerful looks different, if not silly, as the body declines: "If you accept that you are more than just your ego, that you have a soul that is larger than it, opening our eyes to the possibility of our larger Self can transform our aging process into a spiritual opportunity." (p. 30)

What does it mean to a musician to have a chuck-it list? (Play that Grieg Concerto? Not with this thumb. Let it go.) One retired pianist and choir director described taking learning certain difficult compositions off her bucket list as "sweet loss" – sweet because

she can still listen to those beloved pieces, loss because she's not going to be the one playing them. At the young age of 22, Yusuf/Cat Stevens took a whimsical attitude to-ward aging in Moonshadow:

"I'm being followed by a moonshadow...

... And if I ever lose my eyes, if my colors all run dry,

Yes, if I ever lose my eyes, I won't have to cry no more.

...And if I ever lose my mouth, all my teeth, north and south,

Yes, if I ever lose my mouth, I won't have to talk no more."

Yusuf's message seems to be, "find hope in any situation. Be present and joyful. See life as it is, right now, and don't compare it to others' lives, or other times in your life." And, if you feel unreasonably compelled to do something that is no longer feasible... chuck it!

New Film Release: The Philadelphia Eleven

The question of ordaining women to the priesthood caused deep division in the Episcopal church. There were years of discussions, failed resolutions, and pleas for action. Finally, in an act of civil disobedience, a group of eleven women and their supporters organized their extracanonical ordination to become Episcopal priests in 1974. The Church of the Advocate in Philadelphia welcomed them, but change was no small task. The women were harassed, some lost friends, and others were banned from stepping on church property. In a new documentary film, *The Philadelphia Eleven*, we meet the women who succeeded in building a movement that transformed an age-old institution and challenged the very essence of patriarchy in Christianity.

The Philadelphia Eleven is being shown at Episcopal churches across the country, including two screenings in Northern Virginia in November: November 5 at 6 p.m. at St. Alban's, Annandale and November 11 at 6:45 p.m. at Holy Comforter, Vienna. The posters were displayed at the church, and on October 14 at the walk. Thanks to our walkers, as well! The St. Barnabas' team included Beth Campbell, the Bolin Shellito Family, Diana Greer, Jocelyn & Steve Leatherwood, Teresa Merchant, and Delilah & Owen Stearns. Camille & Ken Mittelholtz and Elsa Cannon helped with walk logistics.

Donations are invited through November - you can make a check payable to CWS/CROP (please give to Camille), donate online through <u>https://events.crophungerwalk.org/2023/team/st-barnabas-episcopal-2</u>, or donate with a check to St. Barnabas', designating CROP Walk in the memo line. CROP Hunger Walks raise funds for Church World Service, which works both in other countries and in the U.S. to fund hunger and disaster relief and refugee assistance and reset-tlement, as well as sustainable development projects like drilling wells. ACCA receives part of the funds raised by the Annandale Walk to help fight hunger and poverty locally.

Child Development Center - The new school year is under way, and Center staff are working to fill preschool openings. The Center continues to serve many children with special needs.

Furniture Ministry – St. Barnabas' volunteers served at the Furniture Ministry on October 7, when two crews completed 4 deliveries and 7 pickups. One crew used the truck recently given to ACCA by an LDS program, which replaced a truck which had been donated by Fairfax County Fire and Rescue about 10 years ago. ACCA has given the "fire truck" to Melwood to support programs for disabled adults. Our next turn to volunteer will be <u>Saturday morning</u>, <u>January 27</u>.

Emergency Assistance - In September, ACCA made a total of \$19,613 in payments for rent or utilities for 26 households. Food Pantry volunteers delivered urgently needed food and hygiene supplies to 114 households in September. Food and hygiene product donations can be left in the basket in the Narthex. The pantry needs volunteer drivers to deliver food on weekday afternoons.

Transportation - The joint ACCA - Shepherd's Center continues to need volunteer drivers to take people to medical appointments and weekend shopping.

Our next Parish Retreat is scheduled for September 28-30, 2024. Please consider joining us for a wonderful weekend on the Sacred Mountain.








