Vestry Highlights - August 2022

- Len LeRoy, Ed Ing and Norma Ricketts presented an overview of St. Barnabas' relationship to our sister parish in Cuba, Iglesia Episcopal San Juan Bautista in Palma Soriano, Cuba.
- The Vestry approved a motion to contribute \$40,000 to San Juan Bautista to be used for the purchase of a house that will provide much needed space for the parish.
- The Vestry plans to appoint a Cuban Mission Committee that will assist with St. Barnabas' continued sponsorship of the parish and will coordinate future fundraising activities.
- Plans for St. Barnabas' 60th Anniversary Celebration for September 16 – 18 are underway. Plans include a TGIF at the Shellito's, a gathering for reflections and memories of St. B. on Sat. (with refreshments); and a luncheon following the 10:15 service with games and "Dunk the Rector". A “Note” from David Palmer: Listening

It was the feast of Pentecost, and Father John captured my imagination when he spoke about love languages in connection with the disciples speaking in multiple languages on the birth of the church. In my own words, God gave the disciples the gift of speaking the languages of their listeners as a gesture of love. God cares for us so much that, rather than insist that we learn a particular language, God speaks to us in one we can understand. This applies to us in that it's not enough for one to declare their love language; someone – you? – has to learn it and use it in order for them to feel loved.

But there is another side to this proposition: someone has to listen. We know that God listens, but isn't it nice when one of God's children listens to us, too? As someone who has spent countless hours alone playing music, I can say with some authority that it's a different matter when a body is in the room listening. Granted, I might get self-conscious and make more mistakes, but, when someone listens, there is the possibility of connection, that maybe all the yearning, joy, tension, peace, and exhilaration that I'm pouring into my music is being heard by someone. Without a listener, all of our speaking or music-making is only so much shouting or fiddling in the wind.

You can imagine how important listening is to every musician and every music lover. I was a music listener before I was a music player, and, even when my days of playing are over, I'll probably be listening—if my hearing isn't gone. One of my favorite things to do, usually at night, is to put on some headphones/earbuds and listen as deeply as I can. Even a simple pop song that I've heard 19 times can yield discoveries. *I hear a trombone. Is that a second guitar part? I hadn't noticed that before. The piano seems more prominent during the verses. Is there reverb on just the voice? Is one of the bass player's strings out of tune?* Try it sometime.

I was meditating on this when, after a staff meeting, I noticed a pile of books called Listening Heart in the St. Barnabas Library. (I'm wondering if this is or was a book being studied by EfM or some other group at church.) Do you listen to God deeply, as deep as your heart? Harriet Tubman listened to God as she led enslaved people to freedom, and none of her passengers on the underground railroad were caught. But how about people? Do you listen to them with your heart? There was an expression that my mother and some others were using some 40 years ago, “listening people into wholeness,” or something like that. The idea is that many people are so longing to be deeply heard that giving them one's full attention has a healing effect.

When you talk to someone, do you get cues from them that they are or are not listening? I've noticed in a small percentage of people (they make good therapists) a certain stillness in their facial expression while I'm talking, and it changes when it's their turn to speak. Eye contact and occasional nodding can be signs that someone is listening. Good

listeners listen as much as they talk and ask good questions. Asking good questions is a skill that we can learn, like learning someone's love language.

What about listening to the music of nature? Try deeply listening to the birds in your environment. As I write this, we are in that time of year when katydids are chorusing at night. I find their sound to be soothing—to the extent that I can block out the sound of air conditioning, helicopters, traffic, sirens, etc. Maybe someday, we can do some intentional music- or people- or nature-listening as a church family. For now, I'll sign off the same way I sign off from my radio show, just before saying good night: "Thanks for listening."

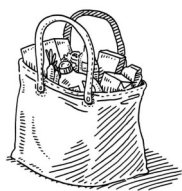
The Walk raises funds for Church World Service (CWS) and ACCA. CWS partners with other organizations around the world to fight against the challenges of disease, disaster, displacement, and other concerns that leave people hungry. CWS recently provided emergency blankets, hygiene kits, and cleanup buckets to tornado victims in Kentucky; supported a community center in Moldova for refugee children from Ukraine and gave emergency funds for the families it helps; supported educational programs and provided seeds and tools for farmers in Cambodia; and supported refugees at camps in Tanzania.

Rebuilding Together Arlington/Fairfax/Falls Church is planning a fall workday, and ACCA plans to sponsor a home repair project. Volunteers are needed, but the workday is likely to be October 1, which coincides with our annual Parish Retreat weekend. If you know a low-income homeowner who needs help with safety and home repair, Ken or Camille can provide information on how to apply.

The ACCA Furniture Ministry will resume Saturday morning deliveries of furniture to families in need as well as pickups of donations on September 10. We will need volunteers for St. Barnabas' crew. 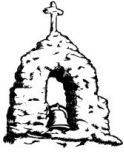


TGIF is Back!

Feeding Shut-ins in Cuba

We can no longer have food delivered to him as we have in the past because the country's infrastructure cannot support delivery. Instead, Noel+ buys what food is available locally with funds from St. Barnabas' which members of the parish use to prepare food for shut-ins.

Diocesan News

The Rt. Rev. Susan E. Goff, Bishop Suffragan and Ecclesiastical Authority, announces with thanksgiving the appointment of the Rt. Rev. Paul Bayes, retired Bishop of Liverpool, as a Visiting Bishop in the Diocese of Virginia. Bishop Bayes will serve in the Diocese from mid-September through December 5, 2022. His wife Kate will accompany him.

Bishop Bayes has been a frequent visitor to the Diocese of Virginia for many years in his role with the Triangle of Hope. The Triangle of Hope is a covenantal community between the Dioceses of Liverpool (England), Kumasi (Ghana), and Virginia dedicated to transforming the long history and continuing presence of slavery in our world through repentance, reconciliation and mission.

Bishop Goff served as a Visiting Bishop to the Diocese of Liverpool from 2015 through 2019. She visited for two or three weeks each year in such ministries as speaking at a clergy conference, leading a pre-ordination retreat, meeting with women clergy, preaching at the Cathedral and sharing in services of Confirmation. "I am delighted that we now bring this dimension of our relationship full circle as Bishop Bayes joins in our ministries for a season," Bishop Goff said. "I look forward to seeing how the Holy Spirit will continue to lead and guide us in this time."

Bishop Bayes will provide vital support to the Diocese through visitations to churches, diocesan gatherings and other ministries of the Episcopate.

News from General Convention

This summer, July 7 through 10, I was fortunate to be able to serve as a volunteer at the Episcopal Church's 80th triennial General Convention in Baltimore. What I experienced there made me proud to be an Episcopalian and hopeful for the future of the Church.

My primary job was to hand out and collect the devices and headsets through which non-English speaking delegates received their simultaneous translation. That left me with a lot of time to appreciate what was going on. I was in the House of Delegates where four lay people and four clergy from each diocese (802 total delegates) discuss and vote on Resolutions. The President of the House of Delegates, the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings, conducted the sessions with grace, humor, and wisdom. This was her last Convention after 10 years, and it is clear that she has been a real gift to the Church.

I was particularly encouraged by the diversity/inclusivity in our Church as represented at Convention: more young people (20s & 30s) than I had expected, many non-white people, and both gay and trans clergy. I was optimistic for the future of the Church when I heard discussions on non-standard parishes that are completely online, ones in which the majority of the congregation doesn't care about "Episcopal"—they just like that parish, parishes that are half Lutheran and half Episcopalian, etc. I saw the next generation of our Church there.

Two personal experiences stand out for me. One happened when I stayed late to do an extra shift at the House of Bishops when they had an unscheduled evening meeting. I got hugs from Bishop Dede, my former rector, and from Bishop Griselda, the Bishop of Cuba. Hugs are always a good thing! The other moment that stands out was when I heard a delegate speak about being beaten in an indigenous school (formerly called Indian Schools). There is a big difference between reading about that in an email report of the Convention and being in the same room with her and hearing it in person. The Convention voted unanimously in favor of a Resolution to research the Episcopal Church's complicity in mistreatment of students at indigenous schools. Finding out what happened is the first step toward penitence and atonement.

Volunteering at General Convention was a great experience, and I am already considering going to Louisville, KY in 2024 to do it again. We commend this statement of commitment to you, the members of our congregation, and we invite you to join us in prayer for the advance of God's reign.

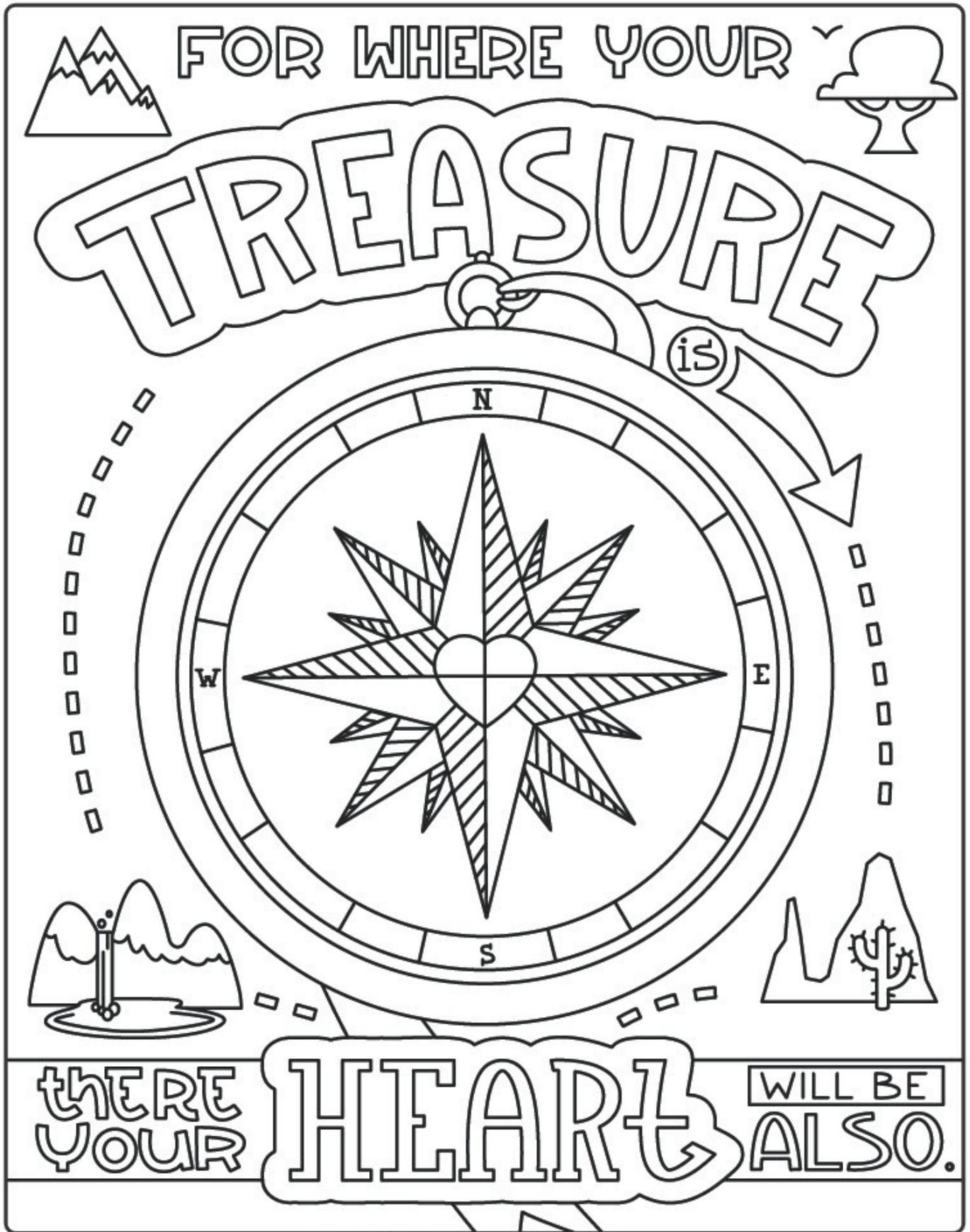
