
The Fourth Sunday in Lent March 19, 2023 – 10:15 a.m.

In the season of Lent, our worship changes its shape to reflect the penitence and fasting of this season. We have put away our Alleluias until Easter.

We are encouraged to kneel when we pray during this season. Then in Eastertide, we are invited to stand before the Lord when we pray.

On the first Sunday of Lent, the service begins with the Great Litany. On the following Sundays, the penitential order will open the service. This will place the confession of sin at the beginning of the service.

Hymns will focus our attention on the self-examination and reflection of the season. All these adjustments are made that ours might be a Holy Lent.

Welcome! We are a diverse community committed to carrying out Christ's mission in the world around us, strengthened, nurtured, and guided by the presence of the Holy Spirit. Some of us were born into the Episcopal Church, some of us were received into it as adults, and some of us are discovering it for the first time. 1 Samuel 16:1-13

The Lord said to Samuel, "How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons." Samuel said, "How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me." And the Lord said, "Take a heifer with you, and say, 'I have come to sacrifice to the Lord.' Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the

one whom I name to you." Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, "Do you come peaceably?" He said, "Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice." And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

When they came, he looked on Eliab and thought, "Surely the Lord's anointed is now before the Lord." But the Lord said to Samuel, "Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart." The Nicene Creed




