The business of a Christian is everywhere and always one: to increase one's fire and let it give light to everyone.



So said Leo Tolstoy in his day. So say the members of St. Barnabas' who invite us all into a season of reflection upon our stewardship of the gifts God has given us. In conjunction with our parish retreat which takes the theme "Activism for Christ," we will ponder the ways that we increase our fire so that the light of Christ can make a difference in the world.

We begin with a recognition that we need the home fires to be burning. Without the foundation of a supportive structure--the fire of hearth and home, as it were--it is hard to keep body and soul together in order to serve. I myself have learned that lesson well in recent months, living out of a suitcase at a hospital followed by a house move. As a church as well, we need a stable place to gather for worship, learning, fellowship, and service--in other words, a place to call "home." We need stable leadership to pull us together as a team of God's servants.

Then we light a candle, receiving the light of Christ and helping it burn. As individuals and as a community, we must be intentional about feeding the fire in ourselves and others. That means figuring out what helps one's spiritual fire burn stronger and what we can do to help others increase their fire. One may lean more in the direction of contemplation, another toward action. There are many kinds of fuel to add to the fire. Perhaps the oxygen necessary for fire is the atmosphere of supportive love that pervades Christ's church.

Finally, that fire gives light to everyone. When we give a lighted candle to a newly baptized Christian, I often say, "Light that is not shared is darkness." We send that new Christian forth to join us in sharing the light of Christ with the world. To share that light we give of ourselves--our time, our energy, our gifts, our financial resources, and our prayers.

May this be a rich season of renewed commitment to receive the light of Christ with joy, to keep the fire burning with loving care, and to share that light with those who sit in darkness.



Bylaws Revision Changes Number of Vestry Members

At the September vestry meeting the following revision was unanimously voted into our bylaws (see below). The original bylaws stated our vestry is to have 14 members; the revision decreases the number of vestry members to 9. This change was made to better match the total vestry number to our total number of parishioners. This change will occur gradually over a number of years as current members roll off the vestry and fewer members are voted on, until we reach the goal of nine. As you can see, this year three new members will be elected to the vestry instead of four. Recommendations for new vestry members can be sent to noah.stetzer@gmail.com.

Section 5.02. Number, Eligibility, and Term of Vestry Members.

A. Number. The Vestry shall consist of nine members in accordance with Diocesan Canon 11, Section 2. Beginning with the Annual Election in calendar year 2015, the following election cycle shall take place in order to reach and maintain 9 members:

2015 – Elect 3 members; repeat in 2018, 2021, etc....

2016 – Elect 3 members; repeat in 2019, 2022, etc....

Status of the Worship Space Renewal Project

We are still in a bit of a holding pattern on the Worship Space Renewal (WSR) Project for choir loft renovation, related electrical work, and lighting improvements in the nave. Our design has been worked up by an architect, and a package is being readied for submission to Fairfax County for review and permitting. The delay we are experiencing now involves meeting the County’s submission requirements for any kind of electrical work in a public space. We have ironed out most of the questions, and we should have a package at the County for review very soon. However, such reviews often raise questions about existing infrastructure, and we still do not know whether the County will require additional renovations. Consequently an actual project start date is yet to be determined.

Our \$25,000 grant from the Diocese of Virginia requires that the church match this grant dollar-for-dollar. The total project cost is likely to exceed \$59,000, so we started with the goal to raise at least \$20,000 from contributions. At this point we have received about half of that. All contributions are welcome and we invite your prayerful consideration about supporting this work. Please mark your check as being for “Worship Space Renewal.”

ACCA News—Annandale Christian Community for Action

The ACCA Food Pantry continues to need donations of nonperishable foods. Volunteers pick up a week's groceries at the pantry and deliver it to households who need the food. Most people receiving food are referred by Fairfax County Social Services or by clergy at ACCA churches. Items most needed are jelly, crackers, canned fruit, spaghetti sauce, bar soap, and paper products (toilet paper and paper towels). Donations can be left in the basket in the narthex. Annandale area food collections on the Governor's "Day to Serve" (September 26) are expected to help replenish the pantry shelves.

The ACCA Child Development Center has begun the new school year. During the summer, the CDC offered a three-week school readiness camp to help children formerly in the ACCA preschool program prepare for kindergarten. The children worked with new teachers and classmates, and took field trips to various museums and local businesses.

The ACCA Furniture ministry has resumed delivery of furniture and collecting donations of gently used furniture. St. Barnabas' next turn to volunteer at the ACCA furniture warehouse is October 10. Volunteers report to the warehouse, on the grounds of the Annandale United Methodist Church, at 8:00 a.m. In addition to the October 10 date, St. Barnabas' is asked to provide volunteers on December 5, and, in 2016, on January 30, March 5, April 23 (tentative), and June 18.

Please consider designating ACCA to receive your donations through your workplace giving campaign. The Combined Federal Campaign number for ACCA is #58934, and United Way is #8058.

We will need them on the morning of Friday, November 13, for that evening's (6 to 9 p.m.) private showing of our bazaar, which is for members of St. Barnabas' and any friends they may want to bring. There will be free food and wine (thanks to Frank Spink). We sell the baked goods that night and the next day when the bazaar is open to the public.

Please think about contributing to the bake sale. We want the things freshly prepared of course, but if you have a recipe that freezes well, you can make some things early. We also will have jars of preserves for sale. Some of these are sugar free, and Bonnie Baldwin who makes the preserves can take special orders.

The Light Shines in the Darkness

As we embark on our 2015 stewardship campaign, our first goal is to keep the fires burning—that is, to care for the infrastructure of our church. As well as the building itself, St. Barnabas' infrastructure includes our clergy, administrative staff, minister of music, and sexton—and the tools they use to fulfill their mission in serving our parish, such as salaries, music, vestments, and so on. At St. Barnabas', we show our love in concrete ways in our outreach programs—FACETS, ACCA, the organizations supported by the Women of St. Barnabas'—the list goes on.
