When I was treated for cancer in 1999, the first sign of change in our household came from the fuse box. In the midst of the morning routine, the circuits would blow. It took a while to figure out that the <u>normal</u> routine was based on me getting up so early that my hairdryer never competed with the television and such. So we had to adjust when I slept later and changed the rhythm of our life. Off went the television when time for the hairdryer.



The the various members of the family learned to buy groceries (and even find bargains), pick up prescriptions, and put lights on the Christmas tree. It meant trying things they had never done before and finding abilities they never knew they had. They discovered things I did and issues I anticipated and dealt with. We got through only because everyone stepped up and took on something new.

Something similar is about to happen in the life of St. Barnabas' as I depart on September 25. For a while I have pointed out to the vestry and wardens things that folks would not realize that I do. Some of it is the janitorial part of my job, but other parts are deeply pastoral. I am not likely to remember all of those elements woven into my daily life, so there probably will be some moments equivalent to the fuses blowing. It will take all of us together being attentive and willing to respond.

This time of transition is a wonderful time for more people to get involved. There will be opportunities for new people to enter leadership. Our hot meals program for the homeless (FACETS) will need new leadership as Sue and Robin Erskine step down. As a search committee is formed, opportunities to serve will open up there or in other ministries that people may vacate while participating in the search.

It will be an important time to look around and discover the members we have not met and discover their gifts and talents. I was surprised lately to find quite active folks not recognizing the names of lovely, gifted, newer people who are in our midst. At my last vestry meeting, I will point out some of those folks--hidden jewels who are being missed.

#### Vestry Highlights by PJ Kennedy, Sr. Warden

#### July

- A Parish Family celebration for The Rev. Linda Wofford Hawkins will be held on September 25 to celebrate her retirement, and especially her service with us at St. Barnabas'. Parishioners, current and former staff, her family, and local clergy are to be invited. There will be a combined service at 9:30 a.m., followed by a program of reflection and lunch on the grounds.
- The Vestry voted to ask the Diocese for an Interim Rector to serve St. Barnabas' while a search is made for the next Rector. The intent is for the Interim Rector to be in place by the beginning of Advent.

#### August

- A request has been made by a congregation, Santa Sion de el Salvador, to rent space at St Barnabas' for worship. The Vestry voted to approve the request for a trial period IF our requirements for times and dates that would not conflict with St Barnabas' church activities, rental amount, insurance, and sexual awareness training are agreed to. If the rental goes forward, the congregation will be more fully informed of the terms of the agreement.
- Shrine Mont will be held the weekend of Sept. 30-Oct. 1. Registration forms are available.
- Plans were made for leadership during the transition period of September 25-early Advent. Supply priests will be hired for Sunday worship, and arrangements are being made to have priests on call for pastoral care. Additional leadership from lay members of the parish will be needed.

## A History: The Women of St. Barnabas'

Much has changed since the doors of St. Barnabas' first opened more than 50 years ago, and nothing reflects that change more than the evolving role of women in the church. In the 60's women had a vital but limited role as helpers rather than leaders, but today there is greater equality, and more freedom for all to follow their different callings. Although the Women of St. Barnabas' (WOSB) now have a much smaller group attending our monthly morning meetings than in years past—as women may choose other ways to serve in the church or may work or have young children at home—the WOSB are thriving and meeting our goals of fellowship and service.



The WOSB mission statement is to support our church and help the wider community, with an emphasis on providing aid to women and children in need. The several events we host during the year provide fellowship and earn money to support this work. Our main event is the *Christmas Bazaar* which will be on Saturday, November 7<sup>th</sup> this year. This is when every woman in the parish has an opportunity to take

full advantage of her WOSB membership! The outpouring of help is so gratifying. Those who don't come to the meetings help set up and take down for the bazaar, and donate crafts, jewelry, baked goods, themed baskets, and wine for the preview party. Two artists exhibit their works at the bazaar and donate a portion of their profits to us. The preview party for the parish will be the Friday night before, with complimentary food and wine.



Other fun fund raisers are the *Mardi Gras* celebration in February with its popular New Orleans style jazz band, and the *Mad Hatter's Tea Party* in May which enjoyed recordbreaking attendance this spring! We also receive welcome donations for funeral and wed-



ding receptions. With the generous support of our church, the WOSB were able to donate almost \$8,500 last year to inreach for St. Barnabas' needs and to outreach for the many charities we support. (continued)

#### Hot Meal Program in Need of Team Leader

Our Hot meals program is in need of a team to replace Sue and Robin Erskine on the first Sunday of each month. They are planning to step down from leading this effort after the hot meals delivery in October. This ministry is very rewarding, and essential to feeding the homeless clients of Fairfax County. Each and every day of the month, some church or religious organization in the county prepares and delivers approximately 100-120 meals, water, milk, and personal products to the homeless, some of whom live in the Breezeway Motel or actually "in the woods." Our assignment has been and is the first Sunday of each month.

St. Barnabas' has been doing this without fail for over 30 years. There are a number of volunteers still willing to prepare and deliver meals. What we need going forward is someone to organize and lead by ensuring the products are purchased, the recipe for our assigned meal is followed, the proper number of meals are prepared, and the drivers are organized for delivery for the Sunday evening meal for which we are responsible.
