

Stand up, Stand up for...Easter!

During the Great Fifty Days of Easter it is the custom throughout the church to stand for the Great Thanksgiving. In the 6th century the canons provided that anyone caught kneeling during the Great Fifty Days was to be excommunicated as a heretic! Happily, we no longer go *that* far! Here is what the Commentary on the American Prayer Book, has to say.



“Standing was the universal posture...until late in the middle ages and continues to be the posture in Eastern churches. The council of Nicaea forbade kneeling for prayer on Sundays or during the Great Fifty Days of Easter, days when the Eucharist would be celebrated. Late in the middle ages, when the focus of the congregation had changed from participation in the great Thanksgiving and receiving of communion to being present for adoration, at the “moment of consecration,” we find evidence that some people had begun to kneel for the elevations which had been introduced into the rite at the institution narrative.

“The 1549 Book assumed standing to be the posture for this prayer; Prayers Books have traditionally embodied the principle that people stand for prayer unless expressly bidden to kneel...Standing for this prayer symbolizes our new life in Christ and the congregation’s participation in the prayer offered in their name.” (Hatchett, Marion J., Commentary on the American Prayer Book, Seabury Press, 1982, p. 364)

The Great Fifty Days of Easter are to the Christian Year what Sunday is to the week, one-seventh of the year, and a sacred and holy time in which we rejoice! It concludes on June 4th this year with the great celebration of Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit, and a baptism.



Vestry Highlights - March, April 2017



March

Seminarian Report: Jeff Stevenson is the first seminarian sponsored by St. Barnabas', and came to the meeting to report on his program and progress at Virginia Theological Seminary. He has done field education at St. James', Warrenton, and next year will work as a chaplain trainee with the Alexandria police department, which will further his goal of working with either the military or with veterans. We hope to have Jeff come to preach at services at St. Barnabas' sometime in the spring or summer.

Good Friday Offering: The Vestry approved a proposal for undesignated plate offering for Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil be dedicated to the Province of Jerusalem.

Diocesan Convention Delegates: The Diocesan Convention is moving to November. Sanjiv Augustine was elected delegate, and Sharon Jones was elected as alternate.

Digital Footprint: The Long Range Plan has been distributed to the parish electronically, and paper copies are available through the Church office. It was decided to share the plan with the Virginia Diocesan Bishops, Canon Wingo, and the Rectors of our Region.

Committee Liaisons: Work is underway to set up a system of liaisons between various committees and other work groups and the vestry, to further communications and build long term leadership of activities. This will also further the work of the Long Range Plan.

Other: Camille Mittelholtz reported that the next Rebuilding Together project is scheduled for April 29. St. Barnabas' is co-sponsoring a house through ACCA. All members of St. Barnabas' are encouraged to participate.

April

St. Barnabas' Day: The vestry agreed to observe a celebration of St. Barnabas' Day with a joint service at 10:15 a.m. on June 11, followed by a potluck luncheon and activities.

Outreach: St. Barnabas' will resume its participation in the FACETS program to feed the homeless beginning May 7. A number of volunteers have signed up for various tasks, although there is still room for additional volunteers. Additional volunteers are needed for the ASYP after-school program hosted by St. Barnabas'.

April 30-May 7 Interfaith Dialogue - Christians & Muslims Seek Greater Knowledge and Understanding of One Another This pair of forums brings together two persons who led forums last year, and from whom we learned a great deal. Rich Geissler has generated and led thought-provoking discussions on Christian-Muslim relations at St. Anne's in Reston, where he is a member. He has certificates from the Virginia Theological Seminary Lay School of Theology and Evening School of Theology. Imam Mehmet Ayaz serves at the Ezher Bloom Mosque and the Institute of Islamic and Turkish Studies. In addition to speaking to St. Barnabas' Adult Forum, he has helped to generate shared meals and fellowship between members of his Mosque and members of St. Barnabas'. Each man in turn will be the leader one week and the "first responder" the other week.

Date TBD Architecture and Worship Throughout the Ages Stephen Ackert will show how cultural and political conditions as well as changing theology brought about changes in the way churches were built and existing structures were reconfigured in various periods of church history. This forum discussion will prepare us for a field trip at a later date, which will include visits to area churches that exemplify some of the styles discussed.




Centering Prayer

The Easter Parade by Canon Flanagan

In the 1860's, St. Luke's Hospital at 5th Avenue and 54th Street in Manhattan was on the outskirts of town. An Episcopal institution run by Sister Anne Ayers, it was the companion of the Church of the Holy Communion where the Sisterhood of the Holy Communion had been founded, along with the church and the hospital, by The Rev. William Augustus Muhlenberg, Rector. Holy Communion Church was "in town" at 6th Avenue and 20th Street.

At a time when the Episcopal Church still reveled in the effects of the Reformation, when ceremony was minimal and colors were predominantly black and white, flowers were not used. Coming from a German background, Mr. Muhlenberg restored the presence of flowers in the church, particularly at Easter.

After the Easter services were over, the ladies would gather the flowers from the church. Then, together with their husbands and other members of the parish, they carried the flowers, walking across to 5th Avenue and then thirty-four



blocks uptown to St. Luke's Hospital. This was an unusual event in the life of Manhattan—a large group of finely dressed individuals walking with flowers (in the days when horses still dominated the streets) - and people came out to watch them pass. And so was born the Easter parade.

The Rev. Mr. Muhlenberg's ministry was, at the time, often bold and innovative, anchored by its concern for sacramental worship and evangelism. Patients in hospital were to him "guests" to whom we might minister in Christ's name. He died in 1877, and the observance of his feast day is April 8th.

A Note from Tom Lyles

Dear St. Barnabas' Family,

I'm overdue in writing to thank you for your many kindnesses and prayers during the last few years, which had no small part in bringing me safely through to this day. I'm referring to the successful removal of a brain tumor this past November and my ongoing recovery. It really feels like a miracle, and yet as thrilling as that is, I feel awkward and insensitive talking about it when we all know people who could use a miracle of their own.

Recovery has been slower than I had expected in the first days following surgery. Apparently the brain doesn't like empty cavities, and my recent MRI showed that an arachnoid cyst has taken the place of the tumor. This fluid-filled cyst may reduce over time on its own, so my surgeon is taking a watch-and-wait approach. Meanwhile, I'm dizzy and unbalanced and fairly weak. I am somewhat impatiently waiting until I can again drive (there's no Uber or Lyft in South Boston!) and resume physical therapy, but I keep reminding myself that I'm very lucky to still be here!

Thank you so much for your love and prayers. I'm especially grateful to an angel who emailed me each day from the days leading up to surgery through my hospital stay and beyond. Her messages were a lifeline during the whole ordeal, but I won't embarrass her by naming her here.


