Episcopal Church Policy -Advancing the Reign of God

Have you ever wondered what the Episcopal Church's position is on an "issue of the day?" Have you ever wondered how the church goes about developing positions, and what we do once we've established a position?

The foundation for these issues is the General Convention and the Executive Council, which passes resolutions that establish the church's foundation for action by individuals, dioceses, church-based organizations, and the Episcopal Church as a whole. This work is facilitated by the Office of Government Relations on Capitol Hill and the Episcopal Public Policy Network.

From their websites:

The Office of Government Relations represents the policy priorities of the • Forum on Race and Episcopal Church to the U.S. government in Washington, D.C. We aim to shape and influence policy and legislation on critical issues, highlighting the voices and experiences of Episcopalians and Anglicans globally. All of our work is grounded in the resolutions of General Convention and Executive Council, the legislative and governing bodies of the church. Drawing on the priorities of General Convention and Church leadership, we structure our work around the three pillars of the Jesus Movement: Care of Creation, Reconciliation, and Evangelism. We seek to connect Episcopalians to their faith by educating, equipping and engaging them to do the work of advocacy through the Episcopal Public Policy Network (EPPN).

The Episcopal Public Policy Network is a grassroots network of Episcopalians across the country dedicated to carrying out the Baptismal Covenant call to "strive for justice and peace" through the active ministry of public policy advoca-

If you have a passion, and want to know whether the Episcopal Church has considered it, a good place to check is the Archives located here: https:// www.episcopalarchives.org/. I just entered "ecology" in the search box and uncovered links to 108 resolutions. "UTO" yields 174. They are available to read if you have an interest.

With General Convention coming up this summer proposed resolutions are already coming in. Some are submitted by the committees, commissions, boards, and agencies of the church and are known as "A" resolutions; "B" resolutions are submitted by bishops; "C", by provinces and dioceses; and "D" by deputies.

Vestry Highlights - May and June 2018

May 2018

<u>Financial Report</u>: John Westerlund, Treasurer, announced that the Parochial Report has been finalized.

<u>Banner Policy</u>: Camille Mittelholtz, Senior Warden, presented the Banner Policy worked out with the Buildings and Grounds Committee, which provides a clearly laid out plan for storage of banners, and how they are proposed and approved. The policy was approved by the Vestry.

St. Barnabas Day: Plans were reviewed. The day will include the presentation of parish gifts to our newly graduated seminarian, Jeff Stevenson, installation of the officers of Women of St. Barnabas' and new Vestry members, and a parish luncheon.





On-Going ASYP Operations and Scholarship Fund

In 2006 the Annandale Safe Youth Project started operating at the church. Now in its twelfth year, Second Story (formerly Alternative House), which is funded by a Fairfax County grant, and St. Barnabas' partner to provide homework help, healthy meals and activities, and mentoring to at-risk 3rd through 6th graders from Braddock Elementary School.

Aden Riggin, husband of Monnie Riggin, was the first volunteer coordinator for the program. When Aden died in 2008, a college scholarship fund was created in his memory. The first scholarship was presented on September 27, 2016 to Beverly Duran, an ASYP alumnus and a Northern Virginia Community College (NVCC) student. The awarding of the scholarship was a joyous occasion, and Beverly spoke encouragingly to the current ASYP students about the need to continue to work toward their dreams and aspirations. In awarding the scholarship, the difficulty of publicizing and selecting the scholarship recipient became obvious. Neither Second Story nor the church can effectively track the students after they leave ASYP. Following discussions with Monnie Riggin, the church this year transferred the Riggin memorial fund to the Northern Virginia Community College Educational Foundation. NVCC will be better able to administer financial assistance to NVCC students with preference for ASYP alumni.

ASYP continues strong today, with Second Story providing the basic staffing and van transportation for a year-round program. St. Barnabas' provides the facilities, volunteer tutors, and a soccer coach (thank you, Jack Miller!), school supplies, after-school snacks, and instructional equipment for the children. St. Barnabas' provides for a holiday party in December before the students' winter break, and assures that each child has a "Merry Christmas", however it is recognized and celebrated in their homes and cultures. The program continues during the summer months with more field trips and activities, while maintaining a focus on English and math literacy.

After many years as volunteer (church) coordinator, Ann Woodle moved to Western Maryland in 2017. Since then, Rotha Frye has served as volunteer coordinator. The program today has a strong focus on educational activities and support. A generous gift last fall provided each child with an iPad for instructional use while they are here. The children's enthusiasm is evident to everyone. With volunteers from the community as well as from the church, the program has attracted and can now accommodate additional children.

ASYP at St. Barnabas' operates because of the vision of the first volunteers and the selfless volunteers' work that continues to this day. It is appropriate to remember here Aden Riggin and Robin Holmes as two who have gone from strength to strength in the life of service in Christ. Notwithstanding the passing years, the church remains to carry on the work Aden, Robin, and others began. 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Forum on Race and Religion

On Saturday, March 10, Phyllis McKoy, Shelley Kallop, and Sharon Jones attended the "Forum on Race and Religion" at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Richmond. The Most Reverend Michael B. Curry, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, was in attendance along with other bishops, priests, and the community "to share, to witness, and to encourage" the work.

The forum's theme was "Bending Toward Truth--St. Paul's Racial History, 1844-2000". Two different and diverse panels with PowerPoint presentations, a moderator, and other guest speakers covered a variety of topics and questions on race and religion, intertwined with St. Paul's history.

One panel covered the early years, and the second panel covered the latter years.

Panel topics included the history of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, religion, white privilege and its effects, slavery, life after the end of slavery, the Jim Crow Era, the Civil Rights Movement, and modern day issues including housing, transportation, and education in Virginia, with a focus on the Richmond area.

After the first panel discussion there was a scheduled intermission and attendees met in the fellowship hall to talk and have dinner.

After dinner, the attendees returned to the main church area and listened to the second panel discussion.

Bishop Curry spoke afterwards with an inspirational message to continue in the church's work to end disparity in

order to create a better life for all.





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ACCA News - Annandale Christian Community for Action

Rebuilding Together - Thanks to the volunteers who helped at the Rebuilding Together workday on April 29: Molly Newling, Behn Ayala, James Harris, Scott Cannon, Frank Spink, and Ken & Camille Mittelholtz. Our project was a group home operated by Pathway A coalition of churches serving those in need



Homes, Inc. We made inside repairs, painted outside, and did major yard work, including planting and mulching a hillside. Thanks to Janet George for donating many azaleas, and to Carolyn Lilienthal and Molly for gardening advice. We were joined by volunteers from other ACCA churches: Annandale United Methodist Church, the Annandale Ward - Latter Day Saints, and Lincolnia United Methodist Church. Volunteers from other ACCA churches helped a senior homeowner in Annandale with house repairs and yard work.

St. Barnabas has supported Rebuilding Together (formerly Christmas in April) through ACCA by sponsoring or co-sponsoring a house project for 25 years. Ken and Frank have led the work, many volunteers from the parish have participated over the years, and the church budgets the sponsorship funds.

ACCA Refugee Sponsorship- ACCA will be partnering with Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area to sponsor a refugee family. ACCA has committed to provide financial assistance to the family to help with rent and utilities for at least three months. ACCA will furnish the family's apartment with items from the Furniture Ministry and coordinate donations for other household needs. In addition, ACCA volunteers will provide mentoring, ESL coaching, and other support to help the family adapt to life in the U.S., as well as transportation to medical and social services appointments. ACCA expects that our family will be assigned in September or later this fall. Please contact Camille or Ken if you would like to volunteer or if you would like more information about this ACCA initiative.

Volunteer needs -The Family Emergency Committee is seeking money captains, and the Food Pantry is seeking food captains. Volunteers for both positions work from home and need to have computer and internet access. They serve 1 week every 3 months. "Money captains" take referrals and arrange for ACCA financial assistance to avoid eviction, pay overdue utilities, and meet other emergency needs. "Food captains" take referrals and arrange for deliveries from the ACCA food pantry. The pantry also needs volunteer drivers to make food deliveries.

Furniture Program- Thanks to Ken Mittelholtz and Elsa & Scott Cannon, who volunteered at the ACCA furniture ministry on June 9. The program delivers furniture to needy households and picks up donations of gently-used furniture. To donate furniture, please contact Camille or Ken.

CROP Walk – The Annandale CROP Hunger Walk will be held on October 20 at Lake Accotink. The Walk raises funds for Church World Service. You can help by walking, donating, or volunteering the morning of the walk.

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Summer Reading Recommendation

I have two: *Dandelion Wine* by Ray Bradbury (recommended last year) and *The Size of the World* by Joan Silber (new this year).

The Size of the World comprises six intertwined tales set in Vietnam, Thailand, Mexico, Sicily, and America, stories of love and loss over a period of about 100 years.

The genius of Silber's plot, which never seems contrived, is how minor or passing characters in one piece become narrator of another. For example, at the beginning, a young American woman in 1920's Florida leaves the U.S. to care for her tin-prospecting brother in Siam. He soon deserts her to join his secret Asian lover, leaving her to fend for herself in this foreign country. In the last section of the book, this same brother has returned to the U.S., older and presumably wiser but still in love with the idea of Asian women.

The common thread is the tensions between home, exile, and otherness. War, love, and culture shock take various forms, but the size of the world, it seems, is no greater than the distance to the nearest person. This is a tremendously humane and compassionate book that I highly recommend to all. (322)

News from Lonaconing, Maryland

Dear St. Barnabas' Friends,

Thank you so much for your recent card. It was so good to hear from so many of you! Carol, I hope your knee surgeries go well. It is such a relief once they are done!

I am doing much better now. Shoulder is healing well and I am about ready to get in the pool to work it. I am much more relaxed now and feeling so much less stressed. Bill Woolf asked me if I wanted to set up a Just Asked chapter in Cumberland and I turned it down. Don't need to stir up all that stress again.

The weather has been wet and cold here way too much but not as bad as you have had it. I have hanging baskets, begonias on the porch, and a grow garden bed on the rocks behind the garage! Pansies, zinnias, portulaca's and verbenas in large pots on the rocks in front, and three sunflowers started. I have had to hire a college kid, but they work much cheaper up here.

Summers are busier, with Mindy's Promotion Council planning all kinds of things for the summer weekends. We just had the community bar-b-q in the park, Summer in the Park is July 1st with all kinds of activities and I will probably set up my used jewelry to sell. This is a new project I started while I was unable to sew, but am getting back to that now also We have several days of activities over the July 4th holiday, starting with Sunday in the Park, then the library "campfire" for the community with s'mores, a fire department activity, and fireworks at the middle school. Mid July Frostburg is having a big bar-b-que for a fund raiser, and farmers' markets go on every week.

On really good days I am starting to drive some locally but not if I do not feel 100%. Mindy is working 12-13 hours a day and has been for quite a while now so we don't do much together. She is doing custom sewing only, and just barely made it through Prom Season but Bride Season was already starting. I am hoping summer will slow down some because she is absolutely exhausted but puts a smile on her face and carries on. She is quite the capable young woman.

We no longer have a part-time police officer but the County is up here all the time. No inspections on vehicles, noise limits on mufflers or engines, or pollution controls on vehicles, so it's the bigger and louder the better! I have great immediate neighbors, nice house with a front porch I love, garage, and basement with a queen bed and full bath. Would love to see you up here—it is beautiful this time of year and everything is such a lush green right now. 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The Vestry's Charge to the Rector Search Committee St. Barnabas' Episcopal Church, Annandale April 17, 2018

On Tuesday, April 17th, by a unanimous vote, the Vestry adopted the following charge to the Rector Search Committee:

I. Introduction

The Rector Search Committee (Committee) is a committee of the Parish, appointed by the Vestry, and charged to conduct a thorough, thoughtful and prayerful search and evaluation of qualified candidates for the position of Rector for St. Barnabas' Episcopal Church, Annandale. The selection and call of a Rector is an important decision. The Committee, therefore, should conduct the search for as long as may be necessary for the successful completion of this charge.

II. The Committee

- A. The Committee consists of a chair and six other members.
- B. The Committee shall approach the search process prayerfully, with attention to the relevant provisions of Canon Law and Diocesan and Episcopal Church requirements pertaining to the search process, and bearing in mind the interests of the whole parish and all of its various constituencies and ministries.
- C. The Committee shall meet as often as may be necessary to ensure the prompt and efficient completion of its charge.
- D. The Committee periodically will update the Parish on its progress. The Chair of the Committee will keep the Interim Rector and Vestry informed about developments in the search for a new Rector.
- E. The Committee shall serve as the contact point between the Parish and the Diocese for communications regarding the search. These communications shall be kept confidential, except that such communications may be disclosed to the Interim Rector and/or Vestry.

III. Budget

The Vestry has provided some preliminary funding for the process. If additional funding is needed the Committee will prepare a budget and submit it to the Vestry for approval.

IV. Scope of Search

The Vestry directs the Committee to conduct a national search, without regard to age, gender, race, disability, sexual orientation, or nationality, for a rector who will be an effective leader in the parish, the Diocese and the Episcopal Church.

V. Self-Assessment Process

The Committee shall undertake a process of self-assessment, which shall include a survey of the Parish. The results of that process will be summarized on the Rector Transition page of the church's web site.

VI. Confidentiality

The Committee shall keep confidential any information obtained during the search process that concerns specific potential candidates.

VII. Presentation of Final Candidates

The Committee shall present to the Vestry for its consideration no fewer than two and no more than three candidates to be the next Rector. The Committee shall provide a short, written explanation for its selections. The names of the candidates shall be presented at a joint meeting of the Vestry and the Committee.

VIII. Contract

The Vestry will negotiate with the successful candidate the terms of a contract and benefits package.
