Religion and Politics

If you were to Google "religion and politics," the first item to come up on the screen is this one. According to their Mission Statement:

Religion & Politics is an online news journal, dedicated to the two topics thought unfit for polite company. It is a project of the John C. Danforth Center on Religion & Politics at Washington University in St. Louis.

We feature articles from scholars and journalists who proceed from a single premise: that for better and for worse, religion and politics converge, clash, and shape public life.

If his name is not familiar, John Danforth is a retired statesman who began his career as the Attorney General of Missouri and went on to serve three (six year) terms as the Republican Senator from Missouri. In 2004, he was appointed as Ambassador to the United Nations. Danforth is also an Episcopal priest.

In spite of our best efforts, religion and politics would seem to be integrally related. You might think from the daily news reports that the next presidential election is this November when it is still seventeen months away! And then there are anti- immigration and anti-Muslim movements, the environment, abortion, carbon emissions, and on it goes.

As Christians, we are challenged to view the unfolding political situation through the lens of faith, and to at least consider whether the reverse might also be true. No easy task. For instance, I struggle to understand the evangelical devotion to the current president whose values would seem so at odds with evangelical Christians. *Washington Post* columnist Colbert I. King, an Episcopalian, recently explained it this way. "He [Trump] is all that stands between them [evangelicals] and unpatriotic, anti-Christian and anti-white forces that are trying to take over the country." (WP, June 22, 2019) I confess I find that an astonishing thought. An ah-ha moment.

I sometimes refer to myself as "a recovering English major," so I was interested to come across two words new to me. The first is "exvangelical," which I came across in a piece by a former youth minister, Bradley Onishi. He writes:

History is rife with evangelicals like me who have grown disenchanted with their born-again faith. When the passion of piety flames out, converts are too often left to wander in the wilderness, lacking the ready-made community that their prior churches offered. But things are changing. Recently, those who have left evangelicalism have begun organizing themselves online under the hashtag #exvangelical... the #exvangelical movement is providing the type of group I, and so many other ex-evangelicals, longed for during our deconversion process: a welcoming community that helps the disenchanted work through the process of deconversion.

Religion and Politics (continued from p. 1)

The other new word I came across is "politicology," one of the youngest disciplines in the political sciences that deals with a study of influence that religion has on politics and vice versa. It was established in the last decades of the twentieth century.

Journalist and commentator Bill Moyers, who is a graduate of Southwestern Baptist Seminary, was ordained in 1954 offers these twelve rules for navigating this territory.

1. There can be no religious test for public office, nor a religious test for participation in the political process.

2. While it is appropriate to discuss the moral dimensions of public policy issues, religious doctrine alone is not an acceptable basis for government policy.

3. Public officials have every right to express their personal religious beliefs, and no right to use the power of their office to proselytize or coerce others to adopt any religious beliefs or practices

4. Government institutions must show neither official approval nor disapproval of religion, or favor one religion over another

5. Religious institutions may cooperate with government in programs supporting the common good, but public funds must not be used to support proselytizing, religious education, worship or discrimination

6. Government has a right to demand that religious institutions and individuals comply with reasonable regulation and social policy

7. Public officials cannot use their religious beliefs as a rationale for failing to uphold the duties of their office

8. Political discourse should respect religious pluralism

9. Political figures and the media should not treat religious constituencies as monolithic; political and religious leaders should not claim to speak for an entire religious community on public policy issues

10. Politicians and media should not equate orthodoxy with authenticity

11. Religious and political leaders should not "cry wolf" about religious persecution

12. Religion should not be used as a political club.

This is a long way of saying, "Say your prayers." Trying to separate religion and politics is no longer serving us well. Better to acknowledge that each needs the other. The relationship between the church and the world is a mutually prophetic relationship that acknowledges that God is at work in both arenas.

We need to bring our faith to our politics, and the love of Christ to a hurt and angry, weary and frightened world.

St. Barnabas' July 2019 Mission to San Juan Bautista Episcopal Church, Palma Soriano, Cuba

In three and a half short weeks from the writing of this article, a team of St. Barnabas' parishioners, led by Len LeRoy, will head to Palma Soriano, Cuba to engage in a week with the people of San Juan Bautista Episcopal Church (the mission Church of St. John the Baptist). Plans include bringing supplies and gifts, including new altar linens, and con-



ducting a week-long sports camp for the children, including sports equipment that will be left for their continued use. Importantly, the team plans to begin the work of creating a flexible-use building for parish activities. In fact, the congregation already has begun the work of clearing the lot for this building.

The fundraising goal, approved by our Vestry, is \$18,000 which is to be used for construction of the first floor of the planned building. Nearly 80% of the goal has been met, with over \$14,000 in hand. But this is still short of the need. If you can contribute \$25, or \$75, \$150 or more, please help. Vestry Highlights May 2019

- To ensure that the Education Wing classrooms remain in good order, they will be locked when not in use.
- The Vestry ratified the following resolutions that were approved earlier by the Vestry via e-mail vote.

RESOLVED: That the Vestry authorizes a new account be opened for the Rector's Discretionary Fund and that those authorized to sign checks be The Rev. Carol Cole Flanagan and the Senior Warden, Maria Macfarlane.

RESOLVED: That the Vestry approves the payment of \$1,760.00 for the construction of new shelving in the Chancel.

- Moving forward, St. Barnabas' Day will be celebrated on the Sunday after Trinity Sunday.
- So far, St. Barnabas' has received \$10,000 to help replenish the parish Reserves, used to pay for repaying the parking lot. (The cost of repaying was approximately \$84,000.)
- The work of the Church Growth Committee is ongoing.
- Mrs. Sayles will continue to research the costs involved for a formal plaque or poster that will commemorate those parishioners who contributed so generously to the Organ Fund.
- It was suggested that we consider amending our by-laws.

ACCA News - Annandale Christian Community for Action

Rebuilding Together- Thanks to our team members who participated in the Rebuilding Together workday on April 27-Jim Aiken, Elsa & Scott Cannon, Sheena Friend, Jack Miller, Camille Mittelholtz and Molly Newling, and to our project leads Frank Spink and Ken Mittelholtz. Rebuilding Together repairs homes and makes them safer for their owners. We assisted a couple in Lincolnia who had come to the U.S. from Vietnam in the late 1970's. The team did inside and outside painting, yard work and installed a new vent, railings, a higher toilet, LED lights and smoke detectors. St Barnabas provided funds to ACCA to cosponsor the project, as well as leadership and volunteers. We were joined by members of other ACCA churches. ACCA also sponsored repairs for a group home operated by Pathways Homes.

CROP Walk- The 40th Annandale CROP Hunger Walk will be held October 19, 2019 at Lake Accotink Park. Registration begins at 8 a.m. The walk supports Church World Service efforts to fight hunger and poverty around the world and to respond to disasters. CWS returns



part of the funds to ACCA for use in our local efforts to help those in need in our community. The walk is on the trail around Lake Accotink. Walkers of all ages are invited to participate. Beginning in September, donations will be invited. Volunteers will also be needed to help with registration.

Furniture Program- Thanks to our St. Barnabas' volunteers at the ACCA furniture ministry on June 8 who delivered furniture to needy households and picked up donations of gently used furniture. Please contact Camille or Ken Mittelholtz if you have furniture to donate (mattresses, dressers, sofas, tables and chairs are needed most). The warehouse will be closed in August. In late August, we will receive the fall schedule for volunteers.

Good Neighbor Program – ACCA's Good Neighbor program began mentoring refugee families in our area in late 2018 through a "Homework Club". After a summer break, the program will begin again in September. Volunteer tutors, mentors and drivers will be needed.

Food Pantry- Please consider donations of nonperishable food, household paper goods and soap for ACCA's food pantry. Please leave donations in the basket in the narthex. The ACCA food pantry delivers a week's supply of groceries to households that urgently need food. Most needed items include canned vegetables, fruit, and meat/fish; rice, beans and pasta; peanut butter and toilet paper and napkins. Food pantry volunteers recently began working on Saturday mornings to shelve donated items and to deliver food (in addition to weekday actions).

Volunteer Needs -The Family Emergency Committee is seeking volunteers to process assistance referrals and the Food Pantry is seeking volunteers to coordinate food deliveries. Volunteers for both positions work from home and need to have computer and internet access. Drivers for food pantry deliveries and shelving are also needed. Volunteers serve about four times a year.

Did you know? Historically Black Colleges & Universities

The Episcopal Church was a leader in founding a number of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) in the 19th century, many of which were created after the Civil War to educate newly freed African Americans. Today, HBCUs play a crucial role as institutions that educate thousands of African American professionals, create a pipeline for greater diversity in leadership positions, and advocate for the advancement of people of color in all fields.



Founded in 1867 by the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina, Saint Augustine's University is located in Raleigh, North Carolina. The mission of the university is to sustain a learning community in which students can prepare academically, socially, and spiritually for leadership in a complex, diverse, and rapidly changing world.

Voorhees College is an historically black liberal arts institution affiliated with The Episcopal Church and located in Denmark, South Carolina. The college was founded in 1897 as the Denmark Industrial School by Elizabeth Evelyn Wright, a young black woman and former student of Booker T. Washington. As such, Wright fulfilled her seemingly impossible dream of starting a school for African American youth in rural Bamber County, South Carolina.

CAPITAL RESOURCES AND USER GROUPS

By now you are likely aware that a growing number of groups have been invited to use St. Barnabas' for their activities. But did you know there are eleven groups currently using the building on a regular basis? These groups extend our ministry into the community, and so we are delighted to have them! Here they are, listed from longest-standing to newest among us, including their comments:

Alcoholics Anonymous has been meeting at St. Barnabas' for 47 years. They are grateful for support from the Church, the nice facility including use of the kitchen, and the handicap access ramp, as well as their close relationship with "the Pastor."

Al Anon is an anonymous group for families and friends of alcoholics. They have been meeting weekly at St. Barnabas for 40 years.

RSM Exams The Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music (ABRSM, or RSM for short) provides graded music exams, assessments, and diplomas; parishioner Nancy MacLachlan is one of the examiners. Nancy is appreciative of the easy access to St. Barnabas' and the ease of set-up for exams, and has been conducting exams here for 13 years now.

Approximately four years ago Janet George asked to use the St. Barnabas' Library for her high school alumni association. The **George Washington HS Alumni Association** has been here since, one of the largest and longest-standing high school alumni associations in the country. They appreciate the beautiful building, which is always neat and clean.

Ryders' Rounders holds weekly dance classes most Thursdays from 7:00-9:30 p.m., and offer basic classes at Hope Lutheran (just up Ravensworth Road) on Sunday evenings. Ken writes, "We held a New Year's *First Nighter* (introduction to ballroom dance) at St. B's several years ago, and would be willing to hold another one to see if some parishioners would like to learn more about our 'social contact sport.'" They are especially appreciative of the beautiful wood floor of the Richardson Room, and the outdoor lighting that makes it easy to access the Richardson Room from the side parking lot. They usually have a flier posted in the Richardson Room, and welcome guests to classes any time.

Vietnamese Language for Youth, who held their first event here in February 2016, uses the Richardson Room three times a year: a Thanksgiving party, Vietnamese Têt (New Year's) celebration, and Graduation. They appreciate the comfortable and supportive atmosphere at St. B. The students are happy to have any opportunities to perform traditional Vietnamese dance in their beautiful áo dài (long tunic over long trousers); their potlucks are always a feast! *(see photos)*

Yoga With Friends began meeting in the Richardson Room on Tuesday evenings two years ago. Their name signifies that this isn't just a yoga *class*, but a yoga community. All are welcome! Parishioner Jocelyn Leatherwood is the leader and has this to say about her practice:

I'd practiced yoga for several years before completing yoga teacher training in February 2017. As a member of the congregation, I wanted to share my love of yoga with my St. Barnabas' family, so I asked to start a weekly class. I also liked the idea of opening our doors to the wider community for a non-worship event. Attendance in yoga class may not result in someone attending church, but I think it gives people a glimpse of who we are as a community.

The Richardson Room makes as an excellent yoga "studio". Several class members have remarked on how beautiful the room is. With so many demands on the room, I am very appreciative of being able to reserve the space on a weekly basis.

"Yoga" can mean a lot of different things to different people. Yoga with Friends is a vinyasa yoga class. The word "vinyasa" can be translated as "arranging something in a special way." Traditionally, in vinyasa yoga classes, we link breath to flow from one pose to the next. My style of teaching is a bit slower and gentler than a traditional vinyasa class to provide a class that's both modifiable and sustainable for people of different ages.

In June of 2017, **Oneness Mission Church** began worship services on Sunday afternoons. Pastor Doo Young Jang says that they feel "Thankfulness and joy to worship the living God every time we come to church." In particular, they are "keeping in prayer for our next generation because young peoples don't like to come to church and listen to God." Oneness Mission has an active presence on campuses throughout the Metro area, and also offer a community counseling service through the Asian American Help Center located on Evergreen Lane in Annandale. *(see photos)*

Kairos DC Christian Church is our newest relationship at St. Barnabas'. They primarily use St. Barnabas for their weekly Youth Group meetings, but also have held a prayer retreat and vigil here. Their Parish Administrator writes, "A lot of people have stated that they find this place lovely, cozy, and welcoming and they could feel the Holy Spirit's presence when they come in. You can definitely feel that this church is special. We are very grateful that God opened the doors to St. Barnabas' for us to have our events there. We are forever grateful to Catherine who is extremely loving, friendly, and great to work with. We also thank Canon Flanagan for trusting us and welcoming us with open arms." *(see photos)*
