# **Orienting Ourselves Toward Lent**

Dear St. Barnabas' Friends,

As we approach Mardi Gras and our Ash Wednesday entry into Lent, I'm mindful that our approach to the Lenten season is a spiritual and practical means of taking measure of our lives, taking stock of where we are and where we're going. In ancient agricultural societies, Lent was a time of potential scarcity, when the stores for winter might risk running low, prior to the return of abundant life in spring. It was a time of preparation, introspection, and anticipation, in alignment with the cyclical nature of life.

Each year, there is the unspoken invitation, drawing us into a Lenten practice. A Lenten discipline is simultaneously an expression of faith, a calling to faith, and a leap of faith. There were times where I questioned if I would be able to sustain the commitment—no matter how prayerfully I undertook it. And, there were years where Lent ended up being one of my more public acts of faith, relying on God as I sought to honor God and go deeper in my faith.

Every Lent is an opportunity to orient ourselves towards Holy Week and Easter. I'm hoping and praying that we can return to a practice of outdoor worship on Palm Sunday and Easter, at the end of March and beginning of April. This year, I wonder if our practice can also help us begin to spiritually prepare ourselves for a time when, God willing, the vaccine will be widely available. But more than a destination, Lent invites us into an *orientation* of life, here and now: it invites us to face our own particular gifts and calling, our own particular weaknesses and areas for growth, and above all, those particular practices of healing, renewal, and service, that will help us seek God's gracious and peaceful presence in the midst of our daily routines.

Dear Valued Family of St. Barnabas':

With any luck, by the time you are reading this, we will have a new President and administration in office who will begin the work of restoring the ills and broken pieces of the last four years. Needless to say, I was legitimately disappointed and disgusted by the riot that occurred on January 6 – mainly because the Capitol region is made up of government employees and non-profit organization employees in support of our government. All of these men and women have devoted themselves to selfless public service, so to see extremists display such disregect and disregard for our country and our democracy really leaves me speechless - the only word I can think of is "un-American". At any rate, President Biden and his team have a lot of work ahead of them; please say a prayer for them for there is so much to do.

As far as the St. Barnabas' treasury, we are starting from a substantially decent spot; with good cash flow and healthy reserves with the Trustees of the Funds. A big focus this year financially is that the parish budget has allocated expenditures of around \$455,000 while our pledges are around \$355,000. The Vestry will be looking at ways the church might reduce expenses and/or increase non-pledge income. In recent years, we haven't spent over \$400,000; St. Barnabas has tended to spend around \$375,000. So we will have to watch and see how the finances unfold.

Last, it looks like vaccinations are beginning to roll out; I urge everyone to get vaccinated as soon as possible. If you know of someone who is unable to afford vaccinations, that would be a great cause for the Rector/Rector's Discretionary Fund (RDF). I also endorse being generous to the RDF so that the Rev. Shellito may be able to reach out, do what he can and stop this deadly disease from taking more lives.

I'd like to close by saying that I have the deepest respect for the men and women who have pledged their lives to the service of this country, and also the men and women of St. Barnabas' who have pledged their lives to the spiritual service of our community and country. I am blessed to be part of the work we've done and honored to be part of the work still to be done.

# Vestry Highlights - December 16, 2020

The meeting was attended by the newly elected Vestry members: Ellen Riddle, Norma Ricketts, and Larry Stark

The Vestry commended the Regathering Committee for its outstanding work in keeping the church building safe and for planning for the virtual and in-person outdoor services.

The Christmas Eve services will be outdoors at 3:30 pm (weather permitting) and 5:30 p.m., with prelude music beginning at 5:00 p.m. We hope to resume outdoor and socially distanced in-person services for Palm Sunday and Eastertide.

The research for and consideration of installing solar panels for the church has been delayed until sometime in 2021.

St. Barnabas' will support the ministry of the Seminarian Celal Kamran, who will be presenting a Forum series on Black Art & Theology at 11 a.m. on 1/17, 1/24, and 1/31.

We will meet the suggestion that parishes give 1% of their annual income to the Virginia Theological Seminary.

We have received \$9K from the CARES ACT for Social Security tax relief.

The virtual annual Vestry retreat has been scheduled for 1/23 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Offices will be closed from Christmas until the New Year.

### **FACETS Needs Your Help**

We so appreciate all St. Barnabas' members who have continued or newly stepped up to help support our FACETS outreach program of providing hot meals once a month to the homeless. In this difficult time the need is greater than ever.

Unfortunately, due to age or medical issues, some of our faithful long-time volunteers are not able to help during the pandemic. Remaining volunteers have often been doing double duty, but this is putting a strain on our resources.

WE NEED:

**Baggers** (at least 2) who are able to come to the church the first Sunday of the month every other month to repackage bread into small plastic bags and to fill paper bags with fruit, treats, bread and utensils. This effort usually takes about an hour.

**Cooks** (at least 2) who are able to come to the church the first Sunday of the month every other month to cook and package hot meals to be taken to the homeless in parking lots and motels. This usually takes about 1 ½ hours.

Until the pandemic we did these jobs simultaneously, but now we have the baggers come in first and leave before the cooks in order to reduce the number of people working at any one time. Facemasks and gloves are worn at all times.

Thanks to Cricket Camp, our United Thank Offering representative, for coordinating the December UTO ingathering. St. Barnabas' collected \$2,154 to send to the Diocese of Virginia Episcopal Church Women. We appreciate all the donations! The UTO offering supports a number of Virginia charities and projects selected by the ECW. This year's focus will be COVID-19 relief projects.

In Fall 2020, WOSB distributed \$2,700 to outreach and \$900 within St. Barnabas'. The outreach charities included: Episcopal Church Women (DOV), ACCA, Heritage Food Site, Bethany House, Boys Home of VA, Grace Inside Prison Ministry, Jackson Field Behavioral Health Services, NOVA Mental Health Institute, Rebuilding Together Express, and Warrior-Canine Connection. We hope to send a few other gifts in the next month, though our available funds are reduced because we have not held fund-raisers in recent months. # Love Is the Way—A Book Review

Bishop Michael Curry's latest book, <u>Love Is the Way: Holding On To Hope in Troubling Times (September 2020)</u>, is an amazing book – beautiful and moving. He starts on a very personal level showing how and why he believes in the power of love, always from the standpoint that love is from and about God. One side note illustrates how he came to join the Episcopal church: He went with his then-fiancée to her church and witnessed the Communion Chalice being passed from one congregant to another, all drinking from it – whether Black or White. He decided then and there that if

this could be, then this was the church for him. (Spoiler alert - it is impossible to make it through the first 49 pages without at least several tissues.)

He then moves on to show why and how the power of love will help us through these troubling and terrible days. His erudition is astounding but not extravagant. Rather, he weaves his knowledge throughout as a way of making his point that God is love and that is what we need. The Washington Post for 17 January underscores this message with the words of Martin Luther King, Jr. and his non-violent Lord "whose message is ever powerful, ever new and deeply urgent today. Love, that spirit that seeks the best for everyone and in everyone, can set things right, if enough of us decide to try it." Bishop Curry then finishes the book on a very practical note with an appendix titled, "Love in Action - A Daily Planner". Bishop Curry has indeed given us a way in these troubling and terrible times, and I highly recommend this excellent book.



The walk raises funds for Church World Service to fight poverty, hunger, and disaster impact around the world and in our community; CWS shares part of the funds raised with ACCA to fight poverty locally. St. Barnabas' raised \$3,725.00. Overall, the Annandale CROP Hunger Walk raised \$19,315.00.

The National Rebuilding Day organized by Rebuilding Together Arlington-Fairfax-Falls Church, normally held in late April, may be held later this year. Rebuilding Together currently is carrying out limited home repairs that can be completed with only a few volunteers.

The ACCA Child Development Center continues to provide safe early education for children 3 months through 5 years and cares for school aged children. The center serves children of first responders and essential personnel, children of low-income families, and others.




