As We Emerge From the COVID-19 Pandemic

Friends in Christ,

In our [recent] lectionary reading from the second letter of Paul to the Corinthians, we heard these words:

If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation; everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! 2 Corinthians 5:17

A new creation! What a marvelous promise, and a timely one. Because as we emerge from the pandemic and gather again in groups, we want to go back to the way things were, to the old creation. Of course we do! So, how do we as people who follow Jesus acknowledge our human impulse to go back to the old, even as Jesus beckons us forward into the new?

When the pandemic first began, we fasted from in-person worship and from the Eucharist. We made sacrifices for the sake of those over age 65 and those with compromised heath, since they were infected and were dying at alarming rates. We made sacrifices for the sake of black, indigenous, and persons of color who were dying at disproportionate rates. Our actions helped protect our communities, our families, and ourselves. Even with those sacrifices, some 600,000 people died of COVID-19 in this country alone. May they rest in peace and rise in glory. May their families and loved ones know God's peace in their grief.

As we reflect on what we have lost and what we have gained, we continue to exercise some restraint for the sake of the most vulnerable, including children under the age of 12 who cannot be vaccinated. Rates of infection and rates of death are decreasing in our Commonwealth and in our country, but the virus is still active and people are still dying. So we continue to wear masks indoors public places. We do well to follow the two out of three rule—outdoors, distancing, and masks. If we do two out of three of those each time we are with

June • 2021

- The Vestry appointed Katie Westerlund as Delegate and Beth Harper as Alternate to the Diocesan Convention (November 2021).
- Worship through July will be outdoors at 9 a.m. Worship beginning in August will be indoors at 8 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. (using masks and distancing).
- ASYP Program began its summer program on 6/15 on Tu, W, and Th from 1pm 6pm.
- Vestry is discussing the possibility of installing solar panels, etc. Mrs. Sayles will follow up with two consulting groups that might assist.
- Vestry approved a \$10,000 budget for the Summer 2021 J2A Pilgrimage to Oregon.
- As of May 31, the year-to-date Profit and Loss statement shows income of \$166,523.56 with expenses of \$138,298.75.
- The Men's Group is planning to have their Oktoberfest party this year.
- The Youth Group is planning a roller skating party on July 25; all parishioners are invited. The Vestry approved \$650 for the roller rink rental.
- John+ mentioned that Shrine Mont is looking for male counselors for the summer camps.
- John+ is planning a 2-week vacation in July; there will be a Supply Priest July 4 & 11.

Summer Worship Schedule

The following worship schedule for St Barnabas' has been planned by the Rector and Regathering Committee, with input from the Youth Committee, the Music Committee, and Building & Grounds.

This schedule is contingent upon CDC, Commonwealth of VA, and Diocese of Virginia guidelines remaining favorable to indoor worship, and a case rate for COVID-19 and its variants at or below current conditions.

July - ONE service only, at 9 am, outdoors. Congregational singing will be permitted. No masks are required for those who are vaccinated. Children's Chapel will be held outdoors during the first part of the service. (*No Children's Chapel on July 4th*) Children of all ages are invited to join in helping with Children's Chapel, or simply participate, according to their own ability and interest (including Nursery-aged children). If the weather is inclement the parish will be notified before 8:00 a.m. Sunday and the service will be livestreamed from the Nave. There will be no congregation and no Children's Chapel in this case. Please note: there will be no livestreaming on July 4 & 11. Please see the note on the back cover for more details.

August - TWO services – 8:00 and 10:15 a.m. – will be held inside the Nave. Masks must be worn by *all* participants*, and pods (family groups) are asked to maintain at least 3' of physical spacing between their group and other groups, as much as possible. To help with this effort, every other pew will be utilized for seating. At this time, we are not permitted to have indoor congregational singing; the congregation will be notified if that policy changes. There will be no Coffee Hour (as of this time).

Children's Chapel will be held (except in the case of rain) outdoors during the first part of the 10:15 a.m. service. Children of all ages are invited to join in helping with Children's Chapel, or simply participate, according to their own ability and interest (including Nursery-aged children). If the weather does not permit outdoor Children's Chapel, children are welcome in the church with their family. In fact, children – with all their vocal contributions to worship – are ALWAYS welcome in church!

In the event of a known COVID-19 case among any service attendees, a congregational email will be sent.

* While masks generally are not required among those who are vaccinated, our youngest members – those under 12 years old – are not yet eligible for vaccination. It is on their behalf that we continue to don our masks while indoors.

July Outdoor Worship in the Round at 9:00 a.m. August Indoor Worship at 8:00 & 10:15 a.m.

Among other decisions this June, the Regathering Committee and I have determined (and the Vestry has concurred) that August is the month for us to move indoors for (masked) worship in the Nave at 8:00a.m. and 10:15 a.m. This will help us get a running start on the "new normal" of our program year in September.

For the sake of those who cannot yet get vaccinated, (including the children of our parish!), we want to continue to take care with regards to masking and distancing as much as is practicable indoors. Still, this is a long-awaited transition! I write this with an awareness that contravening guidance could still redirect our path, and also with deep appreciation for the courage, solidarity, and adventurousness we've embodied in our joint outdoor worship services thus far.

Speaking of outdoor worship, there has been much enthusiasm and support among Vestry and others for an idea that Maria Macfarlane lightheartedly offered in our Regathering Committee meeting—that our remaining 9:00 a.m. outdoor worship services this June and July could happen in the round. This arrangement will allow our outdoor liturgical space to more intentionally reflect our incarnational theology: in Christ, God is among us. The Triune God is in our midst. "Liturgy" literally means "the work of the people." Thus, by placing the Altar at the center of our gathering, we can align our outdoor worship space with this theology. The Table can become even more of a central focal point for our congregational worship. However, because it will be a new thing for St. Barnabas' to be arrayed in a semicircle around the Altar, on the north side of the Sanctuary, I encourage everyone who has read this far to take (or bring) their seat closer in, toward the glass doors into our church building. This will allow those who might arrive right at the start of worship to take their seat on the grass closer to the parking lot. With the Altar facing the office wing of our church building, our semicircle will orient us in various ways toward our Nave.

Finally, for those who choose to continue to participate in worship virtually, we plan to continue our broadcast via Facebook Live whenever the Rector's smartphone is available, starting just the five minutes before the service, at https://www.facebook.com/StBarnabasEpiscopal/. Please note that even though they may suggest logging in, a Facebook account is not required to view our Facebook Live broadcasts. We want our broadcasts to be available to all, even as we seek to make God's grace and peace in Christ available to all.

Outdoor Children's Chapel

As we transition to indoor services (beginning in August), Children's Chapel will continue to be held outdoors, since those under the age of 12 are not yet able to be vaccinated. Children's Chapel will be held in conjunction with the 10:15 a.m. service.

Parents are requested to attend Children's Chapel with any child who is 3 years old or younger. In order to safe-guard our students, all children over the age of 2, youth, and adults are required to wear a mask and maintain appropriate distancing. This program will be cancelled in case of inclement weather.

people beyond our household, we protect the children and others who remain vulnerable.

Throughout the pandemic, we pivoted many times, each time responding to the latest change. With so much pivoting for so long, with so many changes from week to week, even day to day, it is not at all surprising that we are a little dizzy right now. Some people are frustrated that a complete end to pandemic living is not coming quickly enough. Some people are in grief over the things that were lost. Some are angry. Many are exhausted, just plain exhausted. We all are feeling some combination of those experiences as we come out of the disruption, challenge, and trauma of the past year. It's ok to name and acknowledge all the feelings before God and each other. And it's ok to rest a bit as we move toward the new normal.

Because we who are in Christ are a new creation. The old has passed away, God is making everything new. The old normal is gone. The new normal is still being shaped. And we are a part of the shaping. 6/14/2021

Annandale Christian Community for Action (ACCA) News

ACCA is partnering with Fairfax County to help households unable to pay rent and/or utilities and avoid evictions. The pantry continues to make deliveries of groceries and hygiene supplies to households with urgent

needs. Fortunately, the urgent requests are fewer than they were early in the pandemic. However, requests are still nearly three times the level of pre-pandemic need. To donate nonperishable food or hygiene products, you can bring items to St. Barnabas'. You also can drop items directly at ACCA (7200 Columbia Pike) Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. Please see the weekly church announcements for information on Saturday collections in July and August.

ACCA expects to sponsor a Rebuilding Together project to help lower-income homeowners with repairs this fall, and St. Barnabas' will be part of that. To observe COVID prevention measures, the project is expected to involve fewer repairs and use fewer volunteers than the National Rebuilding Day projects we have normally participated in.

After months of virtual activities, ACCA's Homework Club for Afghan immigrant families has begun meeting again in person (outside) with children for learning games and tutoring. ACCA also has been providing online classes in English as a Second Language/conversation for adults since July 2020. The sessions for children and their parents will continue, alternating virtual and in-person formats. One-on-one life skills tutoring staffed by volunteers is also planned to resume in the fall. The Homework Club program is helping Afghan families who came to the area through the Special Immigrant Visa Program, which provides visas for persons who worked with U.S. Armed Forces or the U.S. Mission in Afghanistan or Iraq (families in NOVA are Afghan).

The Child Development Center continues to provide quality care for pre-school children. The families of about four-fifths of these children receive subsidies through Fairfax County and the Commonwealth. The Center has provided care for school age children not attending in-person classes at County schools. In the fall that may change.

The ACCA furniture ministry resumed operations in May. The furniture ministry will be closed from mid-July through August. Thanks to those who volunteered to deliver furniture and pick up donations on June 26.

Education for Ministry (EfM) Coming This Fall

Do you have questions about your faith? Most people do, and most find it challenging to get answers. **Education for Ministry (EfM)** was developed by the School of Theology in Sewanee, Tennessee to provide a mechanism for people to work through those questions. This four-year course of study provides the framework for the group to connect faith to their daily lives through reading and discussion. EfM is not a path to ordained ministry. Instead, EfM helps lay people encounter the breadth and depth of the Christian tradition and bring it into conversation with their experiences of the world as they study, worship, and engage in theological reflection together.



At its heart, EfM is a program in practical theology, a program based on a set of five core practices that form and support us in the various ministries to which we are called:

Living in Community

Regular Prayer and Worship

Theological Reflection

Study of the Christian Tradition

Vocational Discernment

Meeting once a week in small groups with people from your community, led by mentors trained to facilitate the experience, you will begin to think theologically, reflect faithfully, and speak civilly when confronted by beliefs and principles in opposition to your own. And that's something we can all appreciate in today's world.

By being an EfM participant, you will learn how to articulate your faith. You will learn how to shape your faith into action. You will become involved in ministries in your community and you will make a difference.

Since its inception in 1975, more than 100,000 people have participated in this vital program. EfM groups meet regionally in nearly every diocese of The Episcopal Church, in six provinces of the Anglican Communion, and some in virtual classrooms with participants from across the globe.

St. Barnabas' has offered EfM in the past, but the last group graduated in 2009. We plan to offer the program again beginning this fall. EfM is a four-year program, but participants register for one year at a time. The program is designed so that people in different years can be in the same group, so we might have Year One and Year Four participants working together. A group typically has 6-12 members and meets weekly for about two hours. You should also plan to spend two to four hours each week in preparation. We follow an academic calendar, meeting during the fall and spring with a break for Christmas; the group will not meet during the summer.

Phyllis Susan McKoy February 28, 1955 – January 7, 2021

A "Keepsake Snapshot In Time" of Phyllis Susan's Life, Legacy & Achievements by Paula Kirk

Phyllis Susan was born to Mary and Charles Jones, on 28 February 1956, in Washington, DC. She had a Big Brother, Michael and has a Sister, Paula. 
