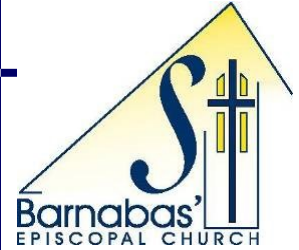

## Lenten Small Groups and Inklings of the Risen Life

Dear Friends,

Amid the stress and exhaustion of this time, I am giving thanks first and foremost for Christ, who day by day invites us to peacefully and joyfully take up the yoke of the Messiah, and to remember that the Messiah's yoke is easy, and the Messiah's burden is light. In addition to our Hypothermia Shelter Meals the week of Ash Wednesday and our work with ACCA, I'm thankful for several other things in our common life.

Most proximately—and with the registration deadline approaching swiftly on Thursday, March 3<sup>rd</sup>—our Lenten Small Groups are beginning on Sunday March 6<sup>th</sup>. Sign up by clicking the following link <https://forms.gle/TosBPjcs7VsQab9A>, or by calling our Parish Office. Groups will gather for an hour at 9:15 am, 11:30 am, or 2 pm each Sunday in Lent, and one Sunday in Eastertide, to consider our spiritual practices through the metaphorical lens of a garden plot. Part of your signing up allows you to indicate which time or times you are available. The program, *Growing a Rule of Life*, is a collaboration between Virginia Theological Seminary and the Society of St. John the Evangelist, originally put together in 2016. A set of daily recorded meditations on each week's theme are available at <https://www.ssje.org/growrule/>, and the website allows you to select March 6<sup>th</sup>, 2022 as your start date for receiving the series of Lenten emails so that we are all “on the same page.” These groups will be co-led by members of the Vestry and the Adult Christian Education (ACE) committee.

A second cause for appreciation is the fact that we are finally able to re-gather in person for Eucharist in the Nave again—albeit with KN95 or equivalent masks, air filtration, and additional ventilation as temperatures allow. However inconvenient these guidelines might feel at times, the precautions are nonetheless a powerful way that we can continue to protect each other. Having Bishop Porter Taylor join us on February 20<sup>th</sup> for the first Sunday back is another encouragement toward thankfulness.

Finally, the most powerful reason I know of for thanksgiving is that the Search Committee has discerned a call for David Palmer to serve among us as

## Vestry Highlights - January 19, 2022

- Cindy McLaughlin presented the details of this year's ministry with the Hypothermia Shelter. We will provide meals and breakfast/snack bags for a week, from February 27 through March 5. We hope to provide personal care items, as well.
- The Ski Trip to Canaan Valley will be February 18 through 21. There are over 40 people signed up for the trip.
- The Lenten program will be *Growing a Rule of Life*. Vestry have been asked to consider volunteering to lead one of the small groups. Parishioners can sign up online or through the Parish Office.
- The Vestry Retreat will be February 5 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.
- Robin Erskine has completed his term as Chair of the Endowment Board. The following members were approved by the Vestry: PJ Kennedy (Chair), Grace Robbins, Marcel Lisi, Mark Patterson, and Peter Badger.
- Treasurer's Report: 2022 Budget shows \$325,000 in pledge income and \$329,000 in anticipated expenses. The Reserve is sufficient to cover the anticipated shortfall.
- The Vestry approved designating all loose plate offerings on Sundays throughout the year for the Rector's Discretionary Fund.

## Greetings, St. Barnabas' Parish!

Greetings, St. Barnabas' Parish! I am honored to have been offered the position of Music Minister for your faith community. I love your name, Barnabas, son of consolation, son of encouragement. For years, when asked to articulate my teaching philosophy, I have been saying that I am primarily an encourager. I have been teaching music since 1980 when I got my first piano student. My first church music position started at the same time, when I was the organist and director of a choir of four in Nevada! My life since then has taken me to many locations, including Bolivia, where I met and married my English wife, Sara; West Chester, Pennsylvania, where our son was born; Rochester, New York, where I got my doctorate from the Eastman School of Music; and Concord, North Carolina, where I got my first full-time university job.

While we were in North Carolina, my wife did a degree at Virginia Theological Seminary, was ordained, and began working as a priest. (She had been doing ministry for years without the title.) Her next job took us to Ohio for four years, and our adult son went with us. When it was time to move to Virginia, our son decided to stay in Ohio, and it was a good thing, because he then met the woman who would become his wife!

The move to Virginia was precipitated by Sara getting a job at St. Mary's in Arlington, where she has thrown herself into all manner of things in their parish life. We have made our home in Falls Church, and I have been busy finding my place in the music of the DMV. As you know, it's been harder to socialize and network during the pandemic, but I find myself playing piano at our hospital once a week, teaching piano to children in Capitol Hill, doing a weekly show on Radio Arlington, teaching a course for Wesley Seminary, and playing in several bands. I am now in my last weeks of working as music director for Church of the Covenant in Arlington. I am looking forward to getting to know you and finding ways to musically connect with your shared life, and I will endeavor to discharge all the duties of my ministry listening, celebrating, and encouraging.

## Meals for Hypothermia Shelter Feb. 27-Mar.5

Dear Parish Family,

There are many things in the life of our Parish that we cannot do at this time due to the pandemic. But one thing that we've kept constant is taking care of each other and those in need.

Starting on February 27th, we will be participating in the annual Baileys Cross-roads Hypothermia Shelter program by providing seven nights of meals for the hypothermia guests. The program, which runs from December through April, provides shelter for the overflow of homeless people, and is made possible by the generous support of area churches.

Over the course of the last three to four years that I have been coordinating our week with the shelter, I can't tell you how fulfilling it is to meet and greet the wonderful clients that need the assistance that the program provides.

This year - much like the last couple of years - we are not housing Hypothermia Shelter clients, but instead are providing meals for a week. Like last year, we also will provide breakfast/snack bags for each day.

Food should be delivered to the shelter hot and ready to serve each evening, if possible. If not possible, we will make arrangements for alternate drivers. If you would like to participate but cannot provide food, we can also accept financial contributions. Please make a check to St. Barnabas' with "Hypothermia Shelter" in the memo line. Please be as generous as you can in contributing, and thank you!

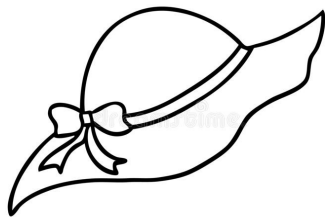

We will plan for our annual Mad Hatter's Tea Party which will be held Saturday, May 7 at 1:30 p.m. – the day before Mother's Day. For those who have just recently become parishioners of St. Barnabas', our tea party is an all-out effort to have an elegant tea party with fun and good food. Our invitation also includes the men of the parish. A fun part of the day is the prizes given for various categories of hats: most creative, prettiest, most original, and funniest... and any others we can think of! We serve delicious treats of scones, fancy sandwiches, cookies, and cakes with lots of tea and other beverages.



We hope to have our annual Soup & Salad meeting in June. It is an evening meeting so that it is easier for working women and mothers of young children to attend. We have a shared dish supper with an interesting speaker. We meet at 6:30 p.m. in the Richardson Room on Tuesday evening, June 5.

We have not been completely inactive during the slow passage of time during the Great Pandemic. We had a bake sale during one of the lulls of the virus and made over \$1,000. We have already contributed this year to the Episcopal Relief and Development Fund and also to the Northern Virginia Mental Health Association. Janet George collected and donated \$30 from our Miles of Pennies jars.

The Barnabees are the craft arm of the WOSB. We help present our Christmas Bazaar in November. The bazaar is our chief money-maker, and much work is needed to make it worthwhile. Some of our older members are not able to do as much as in days past. We will work hard to coordinate the efforts of older and younger members. Aside from earning money for good works, there is a joyous fellowship born of our working together. We will begin meeting again later in the year and hope to be able to host our Holiday Bazaar in November this year.



## Presiding Bishop's Appeal for Support of the Absalom Jones Fund

In late January, our Presiding Bishop, Michael Bruce Curry, asked for congregational contributions to the Absalom Jones Fund which supports Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) Saint Augustine's University and Voorhees College. St. Barnabas' Vestry responded by committing \$500 from the operating fund for 2022. From the Bishop's letter, "Your gift to the Absalom Jones Fund directly supports Saint Augustine's and Voorhees while honoring the legacy of Blessed Absalom Jones, the first African American priest ordained in The Episcopal Church." We are grateful to be able to do so.

## Annandale Christian Community for Action (ACCA) News & Opportunities

The Rebuilding Together National Rebuilding Day will be **Saturday, April 30**. Rebuilding Together - Arlington-Fairfax-Falls Church organizes repairs for local low-income homeowners and non-profits, focusing on health, safety, and accessibility. ACCA plans to sponsor repairs for two houses; Ken Mittelholtz will lead repairs for one of the houses. St. Barnabas' has pledged funds and volunteers. We will know more once we receive our assignment in March. Usually, both skilled and unskilled volunteers are needed. If you would like to volunteer, please contact Ken.



ACCA's Family Emergency Assistance program helped 33 families in January 2022, and gave over \$44,000 in financial assistance for rent, utilities, and other urgent needs. The need for food assistance from the ACCA Food Pantry continues. **Donations of food and hygiene items can be left in the church narthex.** The ministry also needs volunteers to deliver groceries to households that need help, to coordinate drivers, and to pack items for delivery.

Fifteen new Afghan families have begun participating in ACCA's Neighbor-to-Neighbor program since September 2021. The program provides English classes, mentoring in skills for living in our area, help with local job searches, and tutoring for school-age children. Some activities are by Zoom; volunteers provide rides to in-person meetings.

The 2021 Annandale CROP Hunger Walk raised a total of \$17,665 in donations for Church World Service. Church World Service gave \$3,997 to ACCA for our local programs which fight hunger and poverty. Thanks to all from St. Barnabas' who walked and/or donated.

Thank you to everyone who donated to ACCA during the recent Challenge Campaign. The funds raised will help ACCA respond to urgent requests for help with rent, utilities, food deliveries, and furniture and will help support high-quality childcare at the ACCA Child Development Center.

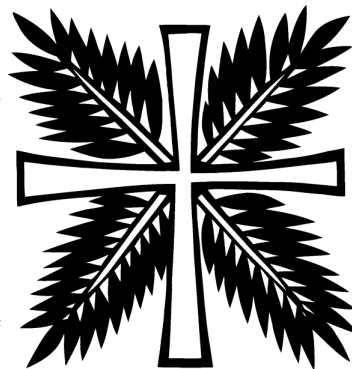

## A Garden Grows at St Barnabas'

Those of our congregation who helped with the Fall Workday in 2021, or who tend to park outside the Richardson Room, have noticed that there has been gardening activity going on.

The slope between the parking lot and the walkway was planted with roses some years ago, but the difficulty of watering that area, the increasing heat of our summers, and the recent arrival of a fatal disease (rose rosette disease) has caused them to fail. As the roses died, the weeds took over, and the area became increasingly unkempt.

With the support of the Rector and the Building & Grounds Committee, a new plan has been made for plantings in that area. The new design takes into consideration the realities of the location: the slope of the land, difficult access to water, and only occasional caretaking. Plants were needed that thrive in dry sunny locations, do not need frequent pruning, would not block the view of the church, and would be attractive in all seasons.

The best way to find plants to fit a site is to look to native species which are already well-adapted to our local soil and growing conditions. Native plants have the ability to co-exist and support our local wildlife, which we have in abundance around St Barnabas'. Many who have taken a walk up to the labyrinth have met our local fox, as well as birds, bees, and turtles that call St Barnabas' their home.

This approach conforms to the ideas of Douglas Tallamy, an entomologist at the University of Delaware, who advocates for planting native plants at homes and community areas to replace the natural environments destroyed by development. See his groundbreaking work at: <https://homegrownnationalpark.org/tallamys-hub-1> or read his book, *Nature's Best Hope: A New Approach to Conservation That Starts in Your Yard*.

Work on our newly-designed garden started last year, and already wildlife is coming to the few plants that have been put in.

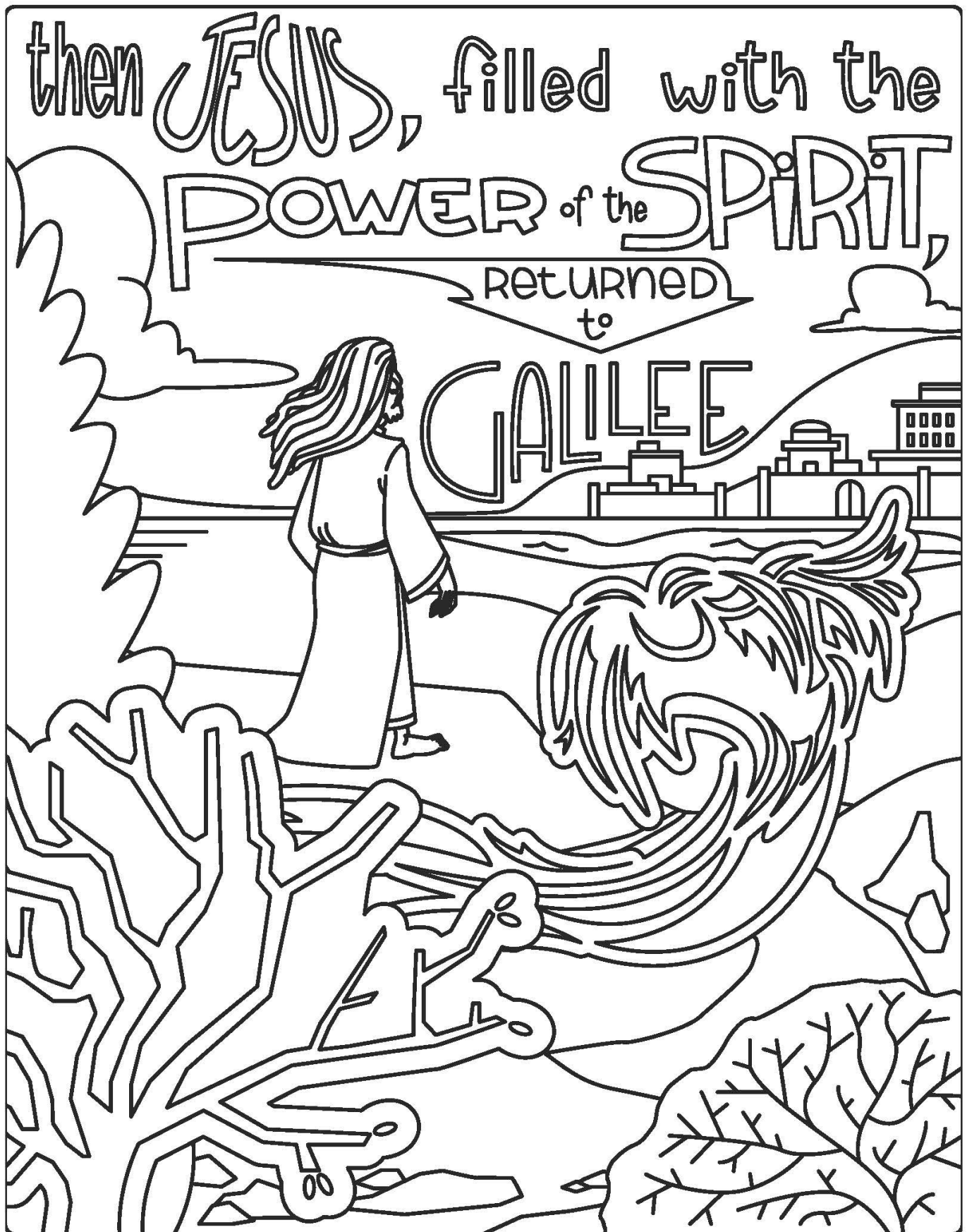
