Faithful Encouragements This Fall

Dear Church Family,


With the feast day of St. Clare on August 11th, and the feast day of St. Francis on October 4th, it seems fitting that many parishes celebrate a more informal "Season of Creation" in the fall. It also helps that the autumnal equinox in the northern hemisphere usually makes for more comfortable temperatures on our particular "stretch" of the earth's sphere during this particular portion of our planetary journey around the sun. Our parish retreat to Shrine Mont from September 30th to October 2nd will be an opportunity to appreciate the Shenandoah Valley and recognize God's presence and artistry outside the busy rhythms of life here in Northern Virginia. Our plans for an outdoor celebration of St. Francis Sunday on October 9th (weather permitting) with a Blessing of the Animals as well as with Baptisms gives us another gift—an opportunity for rejoicing and giving thanks for God's generosity in our lives. This is especially important as we prepare for our own Stewardship season and as we consider the fruits of our labor over the course of the past year, as well as our hopes and plans for the year to come.

God's generosity doesn't just show up in the abundant variety of nature. God's generosity can also be present in the technological tools of our lives and, God's wisdom and generosity is perhaps easiest to recognize and appreciate in the immense variety of life outdoors. At the same time that a celebration of divine wisdom in nature is an important part of St. Francis' legacy, St. Francis' gift can also be recognized as a wise approach to the exercise of prayer—for example, his most famous prayer (found on page 833 of our own Book of Common Prayer), asks in part, "...that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive."

For me, our St. Francis Sunday helps to orient us toward All Saints' Sunday, when we'll have an opportunity to remember and appreciate all those

who have given to us, and whose legacy we join when we share the gifts we have received. That includes gifts of life, purpose, and inspiration. Are there particular individuals whom you are remembering, who are now in your "cloud of witnesses", and whom you can imagine cheering you on as you undertake your own spiritual path this fall? As I write this, I'm mindful of King Charles III's inaugural speech, in which he shared his appreciation for his mother and the powerful encouragement Queen Elizabeth II gave him by her altruistic speech and actions. Are there matriarchs and patriarchs in your life who have encouraged you in your approach to service? Are there particular individuals you are remembering this fall, who have helped you gain a deeper understanding of God's presence, with you and for you?

Our lectionary this season brings us through some good sections of First and Second Timothy—wise words in the tradition of an "ethical will" of sorts, shared by Paul with one of his closest disciples. I wonder if this remembrance can be an encouragement for all of us, to consider the wisdom and encouragement that we have received and that has stayed with us, not only from St. Francis, but also from the other more informal and less recognizable "saints" in our lives.

A "Note" from David Palmer *The Church Has Left the Building*

I was leading an Adult Forum on music at our church in North Carolina, and I said, "Suppose All Saints burned down, and our beloved organ and all instruments were reduced to ashes. Would that be the end of our worship?" I think I was hoping for a resounding, "No!" but there was a hesitation, and finally someone said, "Music is really important to us," and the conversation went a different direction without answering my question. Thankfully, most of us have never had to face the destruction of a church building and its musical instruments - the history of St. Barnabas has been one of construction

and addition. But, in recent years, more churches in the U.S. and the U.K. have been closing than opening.

Sara and I just returned from a trip to the U.K. where we visited several church buildings. During a family holiday in Wales, we stuck our head in St. Illtyd's Church in Pembrey. The parish was founded sometime in the late 11th century, but the oldest remaining part of the building, the nave, dates to the 13th century. A cleaning lady told us that 20 people attend the church (only one man) and that they are too small to have a vicar, so they have Morning Prayer. *(See photo of St. Illtyd's at right.)*

Visiting another chunk of the family, we had nu-

merous excursions on the south coast, near Bournemouth, including trips to Brownsea Island and Christchurch. Brownsea Island is the home to St. Mary's Parish where, since the 19th century, they've had to answer the question, "Suppose your church had no elec-



tricity. Would that be the end of your worship?" The answer in this case has been a resounding, "No!" Their small congregation worships by daylight or candlelight, the wind for the pipe organ is produced by some kind soul pumping a handle (this used to be done by acolytes!) and the wind for the harmonium by one's feet. 
On our last weekend, the extended family and a passel of friends attended the wedding of our niece on an organic farm near a charming village called Goathurst. The weather permitted holding the ceremony outdoors, and the wedding was eclectic and joyful, including "secular" music for the procession and recession, poetry, scripture, prayer, and Christ-centered worship. At one point, a thought pressed itself upon me: "The church has left the building!" The institution of the church was still there in the form of Lauren, the vicar, who wore signs of the institution (her collar and alb), spoke naturally, made jokes, and eased us through transitions or any difficulties (the bride's dress got caught on a plant), but who led the couple through the traditional vows and pronounced the blessing. We didn't need the building, and I am sure that if the power had gone out and my gifted musician nephew hadn't been able to play the electric keyboard or sing through the P.A., the same spirit of joy would have been there.

So, the church, the body of Christ, the followers of Jesus, have met in different buildings over the centuries - an upper room (no instruments there), catacombs, homes, and buildings full of religious symbols – but the church goes on even when it has no buildings. As Peter says, all of us, "…like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house."




