Preparing the Way for Lenten discipline and Easter Joy

Dear St. Barnabasians,

As we prepare to return once again to our celebrations of Shrove Tuesday with our 7pm Farewell to Alleluias, and our Ash Wednesday liturgy on the following day, I'm reminded of my Lenten undertakings from years past. Although different years brought differing degrees of success, each of my chosen disciplines during those seasons brought their own opportunity to go deeper in faith. Each year I noticed similarities and differences in terms of my hopes, concerns, and life circumstances from year to year.

In the broader arc of Church history, the forty days of Lent have also been a time of intentional preparation, not only for Holy Week but also for Baptism and other congregational and individual expressions of renewal and reconciliation. In the northern Hemisphere, Lent is a season of steadily increasing light bringing warmth and the underground beginnings of spring's new life. For many humans engaged in subsistence agriculture in the northern hemisphere, it was frequently a time of stretched food supplies, as farmers foraged for food and awaited the first fruits from their spring planting. Whether Baptism precedes or follows Lent, Lent has consistently been a time for embracing voluntary, self-imposed limitations in the power of the Spirit.

The Gospel of Mark in the New King James Version uses an evocative phrasing, that following Christ's Baptism, "Immediately the Spirit drove [Christ] into the wilderness" (1.12). The fourth chapter of the Gospel of Matthew uses the Greek word "anagó," to say in effect that by the Spirit Jesus "set sail" into the desert for forty days, perhaps also suggesting that Christ was "brought up" into the wilderness for forty days.

This Lent, as a part of our spiritual exercises as a congregation, I'd like to try resuming Wednesday Morning Worship at 10am. We can offer particular prayers for healing in that service, and we can also celebrate Holy Eucharist on the two first Wednesdays of the month that occur during Lent: March 1st and April 5th. I hope this routine might help us consider some of the ways that the earliest Christians prayed together and worked together beyond the regular routine of Sunday morning worship.

A "Note" from David Palmer *Ready for Jazz?*

At the end of the opening track from Wardenclyffe Tower, the 1992 album by the late Allan Holdsworth, a male voice calls out, as if from another room: "Hey! Hey! What are you guys playing? Jazz?! I hate jazz!" It's so funny that Allan would put this on a recording: it's as if the person calling out were saying, "How can this be jazz? I like it, but I hate jazz," or "Now that I know what your music is called, I hate it." Both interpretations point to problems in defining jazz. Pat Metheny, one of the great living guitarists who is called a jazz musician, prefers to say that he is an improvising musician. Improvisation is a big part of what people call jazz, but there are some so-called jazz musicians, like jazz singers, who don't really improvise. Tadd Dameron, one of the most influential arrangers of the 40s and 50s (the bebop era), seldom chose to improvise. Why is he still considered a jazz musician? The answer is obvious to some: it sounds like what they consider to be jazz. But jazz is not a static art form, and jazz musicians since the bebop era have moved on from both the harmonies and the rhythmic feeling of traditional jazz.

One of the innovations in jazz styles occurred around 1969 when musicians began to fuse traditional jazz with soul, funk, and rock music. The resulting genre, called fusion, has produced multiple sub-genres, including punk jazz, jam jazz, progressive fusion, and smooth jazz. It's the last of these that will be most apparent when St. Barnabas hosts a fundraising event for the Bishop John T. Walker School for Boys, Washington, D.C., a tuition-free school for boys, which strives to alter the educational and social trajectory of children from traditionally underserved communities, preparing them for leadership and service in their communities and beyond.

In instrumental pieces, it is common for jazz musicians to first play the song's melody and then take turns playing "solos." Each musician, with the possible exception of the bassist and drummer, makes up melodies that go with the underlying chords. These solos can be muscular and showy or creative and compelling. As each musician solos, the others support them with their playing, even improvising "comments" on what the soloist is doing. The music could be completely improvised, with no pre-determined harmonic or rhythmic structure. For an example of what this might sound like, listen to the music that John Coltrane was creating in his last year, like the piece, Love.

When a group is effectively improvising, it resembles the Church, the body of Christ as described by the apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 12: there is one body and many parts but one head, Jesus, who (ideally) directs things. The parts of a jazz group have different functions but cooperate in the creation of music that the individuals cannot make alone. It's interesting that in jazz the main melody is called "the head." "The head" dictates the

Thirty-Ninth Annual St. Barnabas' Ski Trip: 17 - 20 February 2023

If you plan to attend and have not already confirmed your attendance, please do so as soon as possible. Registration and a deposit must be received by **January 31**st in order to attend.

The 2023 St. Barnabas' Ski Trip will be Presidents' Day weekend at Canaan Valley Resort State Park near Davis, West Virginia - the same place we have gone for the past thirty-eight years. We will depart town on the morning, afternoon, or evening of Friday, 17 February and return to town on Monday evening, 20 February. We will be skiing all day Saturday, Sunday, and Monday (until 4:30 PM - or when your driver says, "Let's go"). Also, we can do night skiing (if available) on Saturday and Sunday until 9:00 PM. There is an indoor swimming pool, whirlpool, sauna (and exercise area) called the Beach Club, so bring your swimsuit. They have a great tubing park, ice skating rink, and, depending on natural snow cover, cross-country skiing area.

We will have a parlor room with sofas, chairs, a table, large TV, fireplace, small refrigerator, sink, and a microwave. The parlor room will serve as our social room for happy hours, discussions, and the Compline service.

We are finalizing the room list and costs for rooms, meals, skiing and rentals, and will forward those soon to those who have already confirmed that they plan to attend. There is a meal plan available for the breakfast buffets and dinners in the resort's Hickory dining room. Prepaid group-discounted skiing and rentals are available at a lower cost. In addition, each room will receive a coupon card at check-in, tied to a credit card, which will give a 10% discount on meals at the resort; ski lift tickets, rentals, and lessons; resort activities (ice skating, tubing) and gift shop purchases. Participants who choose not to prepay for meals and skiing/rentals can use their discount card.
