The Rev. Linda Wofford Hawkins, Rector



Recently I saw one of the leaders of ACCA (Annandale Christian Community for Action) whom I had not seen lately. His passion for his ministry filled the room. He did not look a day older than when I met him on my first day at St. Barnabas' over 13 years ago. He reminded me of other people I have known who give themselves to a purpose beyond themselves and then demon-

strate the life giving impact of gratitude and generosity.

For years studies have shown that people who live connected in community (churches in particular) have better health and live longer. Isolation can be death dealing. Recently Nicholas Kristof, the New York Times columnist, reeled off one statistic after the other about altruism, generosity, and volunteering. So I am now reading the book he wrote with his wife, Sheryl WuDunn, called *A Path Appears: Transforming Lives, Creating Opportunities*.

Perhaps the key is the wisdom of Brother David Steindl-Rast: "Gratefulness makes us young." Gratefulness is the driver behind the ministries in which we work and give for the common good. It is gratitude for all that we have received which is expressed in a natural flow of giving

One of my favorite commercials on television shows the adult son picking up the bill at the restaurant. After that moment of generosity, we hear the inner voices of concern for one another in the heads of father and son. Generosity and caring come from both father and son. Emotion wells up in me every time I witness that scene. I know what it has meant for me for my son to reach that turning point both in family and community life. It is beginning to happen in the church and society, but I do yearn to see that same scene in the life of the church as more of us discover the joy of giving.

Nicholas Kristof says secular organizations have something to learn from religious groups who bring to their giving both celebration and community (or even competition). As a church, we do our giving in community, discovering what happens as we join together and how much we need each other. The chart provided by our Stewardship Committee this year shows the giving of our pledgers in steps. Each of us can find oneself on the chart and ask, "Does this spot keep pace with my gratefulness to God? Can I take another step?" Some are already saying "Yes" to that second question. This year over \$31,000 in pledges will be "moving away" due to transitions. Can we step up to their places on the chart? We are a community.

We are also a community of celebration. November 9, Ingathering Sunday, is our time to celebrate. As we adopt a practice of gratitude, that day can be a time of sharing the gratefulness that grows even as we give of ourselves and our treasure.

## 'Sing to the Lord a New Song'

### OPPORTUNITIES TO PRAISE GOD THROUGH MUSIC

**The Adult Choir:** The Adult Choir meets on Wednesday evenings at 7:30 p.m. in the Education Wing. On Sunday mornings, the Choir meets 1 hour prior to the beginning of the service to rehearse. The Adult Choir is open to anyone who wishes to praise God in song and is able to make the commitment of weekly rehearsals.

**The Children's Choir** (children between the ages of 5 and 14): The Children's Choir meets every Sunday immediately following the conclusion of the 10:15 a.m. Choral Eucharist. On the days that the Children's Choir sings, they meet at 9:15 a.m. in the Choir Loft. The Choir is designed to teach our younger members good singing techniques, and to learn about basic customs and liturgies in the Episcopal Church. The Children's Choir is open to anyone who wishes to praise God in song and is able to make the commitment of weekly rehearsals.

**Parish Musicians:** A group of parishioners who, at the request of the Minister of Music, participate in the Music Program by offering their gifts of instrumental music during services.

### NEW MASS SETTING BY THOMAS PAVLECHKO

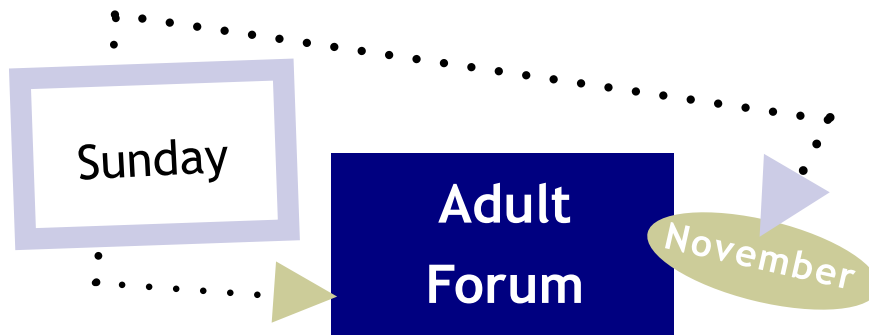
On Sunday, October 19, the Choir introduced a new mass setting by Thomas Pavlechko. Thomas was born into a Slovak-Ukrainian family of organists, pianists, vocalists, accordionists and folk dancers, and was dancing to the music of family polka bands at the age of 4. He began playing piano by age 6, was on the organ bench by 13, and was earning \$5 a week as a self-taught church organist by age 15. He proceeded with his education and ultimately earned a Bachelor of Music degree in organ performance and a Master of Music degree. He has also pursued post-graduate studies in symphonic orchestration. His skills as an organist and choral director are becoming legend. He is currently Cantor and Composer-in-residence at St. Martin's Lutheran Church in Austin, Texas. His fresh interpretation of liturgy and music bring us 'The Calvary Service.' I hope that the congregation enjoys this new setting as much as the choir has enjoyed preparing it.

## Outreach Commission Designates Funds for 2014

During 2014, the Vestry designated \$1,500 for the Emergent Needs Fund which is administered by your Outreach Commission. Additionally, two parishioners donated an additional \$200 to the fund. ### Ubi caritas . . .

In Latin, *caritas* denotes not only love, but also dearness or affection; it can even be used to describe something that's very expensive (and therefore valuable), much like the somewhat-archaic English use of "dear." In the Christian tradition, *caritas* or charity is often used to mean love of God and of humankind. Echoing St. Paul, Thomas Aquinas called *caritas* "the most excellent of the virtues."

One of the most ancient hymns of the Western begins, "Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est" or, in English, "Where charity and love are, God is there." Our *Wonder, Love, and Praise* hymnal includes the Taizé setting of the refrain in both Latin and English. The hymn is often sung on Maundy Thursday, though it is suitable for almost any occasion. Paul Mealor's motet setting was commissioned by Prince William for his marriage to Catherine Middleton and was sung by the choirs of Westminster Abbey and Her Majesty's Chapel Royal at the couple's wedding.

Following the ancient tradition, St. Barnabas' Caritas team was formed to do neighborly acts of love within our parish. The team's ministries include taking Communion to someone's home, providing meals, delivering altar flowers, and providing rides to church or to a doctor's appointment for parishioners needing assistance. To request one of these ministries for yourself or for a friend or family member, contact the team member on call or the church office.

The ACCA Challenge Grant is under way, now through January 31. The Washington Forrest Foundation and anonymous donors have pledged a total of \$36,000 to encourage others to donate to ACCA. The grant helps ACCA serve less fortunate neighbors in our community by giving financial help to avoid eviction, keep utilities on and help meet other urgent needs, buying fresh milk, bread and meat to supplement the donated nonperishable food, and supporting the ACCA Child Development Center. **An Advent Invitation**

Dear Friends and Family at Saint Barnabas’,

As you may know, I am pursuing a Master’s degree in church music at Shenandoah University. One of the requirements in my program is to complete a series of conducting classes, culminating in a “conducting half-recital.” That means I have to conduct a program of about a half-hour of music. My advisor and I have had long discussions about what this should mean for a church music major and have concluded that the coming season of Advent offers an opportunity to present the music within a liturgical setting. With that in mind, we have crafted a “Musical Meditation for an Advent Afternoon.” Hold that thought.

We are coming to the end of the season of Pentecost and the short Advent season is approaching. To me, these are seasons of rejoicing and celebration of Easter and the powerful events that ensued in the life of a newborn church and of anticipation of the Christmas celebration of Christ’s birth. They look both backward and forward. The juxtaposition of the end and start of the two seasons is a great image for me as I contemplate the events that have brought me to this point in my studies – including the support and encouragement of the parish family at St. Barnabas’ as I have made decisions to go back to school – and as I anticipate events yet to come – anticipating the future of completing this chapter of my studies.

So what do these thoughts have to do with each other? Simple. I thank St. Barnabas’ for allowing me to present my “Musical Meditation” at St. Barnabas’. I invite you to join me on Sunday, December 14, at 4:30 p.m. as I do so. I will direct a small vocal and instrumental ensemble in a musical program centered on the Great “O” Antiphons that accentuate the joys of the Magnificat as we await the coming of our Lord at Christmas. You will hear each of the “O” Antiphons and a brief recitation of the scripture it reflects followed by the corresponding verse of the Advent hymn, Veni Emmanuel (O come, O come Emmanuel) and by a movement from one of Bach’s Advent cantatas based on the hymn, Nun Komm, der Heiden Heiland (Savior of the nations, come). The instrumental ensemble will present a prelude based on Michael Praetorius’ settings of that same hymn and conclude the afternoon with a joyous postlude, the Gigue from Bach’s Suite Number Three in D. Afterward, you are invited to a reception in the Richardson Room. I hope you can be there.

Thanks for your steady support. I look forward with great anticipation to the coming Advent and the opportunity to greet you on December 14.
